The Games of the XVIth Olympiad in Melbourne

November 22nd to December 8th 1956.

We do not propose in this narrative to allude again to the numerous difficulties encountered by the organizers of the Games at Melbourne, these started from the day when, at the Session held in Rome in 1949 the Games were attributed to Melbourne. As a matter of fact, the International Olympic Committee did shoulder some of these worries inasmuch that the chief worry of all consisted in the infringement of the Olympic Rules when the Equestrian Games of this XVIth Olympiad were attributed to the city of Stockholm. We shall refrain from recapitulating all the problems and the tricky situations which had to be solved and overcome. In 1955, before the Paris Session, Mr. Avery Brundage, president of the International Olympic Committee, paid a personal visit to Melbourne and after examining the situation, did not spare his criticisms. On the face of it, his apprehensions seemed perfectly justified. Also the fears expressed by some people who thought that the lateness of the date fixed for the Games was disastrous, on account of it coinciding with the slack winter season of the athletes belonging to the north hemisphere. Foremost were the fears entertained by those who thought the Australians incapable of organizing and making a success of a sport manifestation of such importance. Not one month went by, especially during these last two years, without the most pessimistic rumours reaching us from Melbourne (diffused, it is only fair to say, by a certain section of the Australian press) concerning the progress of the various olympic schemes.

But today, we must give the Australian organizers the full credit they deserve and which has been denied them for so long. Their work has been faultless and they achieved a real feat in spite of the numerous difficulties standing in the way ; they settled each item in the most minute details. The stadia were ready on time. The competitors were housed magnificently and this applied also to the visitors. No untoward incident occurred despite the fact that the international crisis took place immediately before the Games and was of a kind that did not tend to facilitate matters.

The various installations for the Games

One of the finest stadium ever erected for the Games was undoubtedly the Olympic Swimming Pool which was designed by five young architects and civil engineers who had recently qualified at the University of Melbourne. This stadium will certainly create a landmark in Australian architecture. The Olympic events were held in the main Stadium which happened to be the 'Melbourne Cricket Ground' of known repute and which has already a well-known past. It is a circular shape stadium and has been enlarged by the addition of an extra tribune with the view of holding about 110.000 spectators. The athletic contests and the Opening as well as the Closing Ceremonies, also, the finals of football and hockey were also held there.

The clay pigeons shooting contests took place in the arena of the Royal Australian Air Force camp at Laverton, while the other shooting competitions were held at Williamsston which is situated 10 miles from the city ; the modern pentathlon competitions were contested in the wooded and hilly site of Oakland shooting club. The olympic park which is the finest sport ground of Australia, has been used by the swimmers, cyclists, footballers and hockey players: The boxers held their matches in the West Melbourne stadium. The competitors of indoor sports held their contests in the Exhibition Building. This building which is 75 years old, is situated in the centre of Carlton-Garden, near the middle of the city. The fencing events were held in the spacious ballroom of St. Kilda Town Hall.

The finest site of all was reserved to the yachting races in the vast bay of Melbourne, at Port-Philip. Another wonderful site, surrounded with parks was the Lake Wendouree at Ballarat, 120 km. from Melbourne where the rowing and canoeing events took place.

The Olympic Village

In order to give adequate accommodation to about 6000 athletes and officials, the

authorities had a full living centre built in an aera situated about 12 miles from the centre of the City. This built up aera contains 841 permanent buildings which will, in due course, be let or sold to Australian workers. For this reason, these houses were built according to the stereotyped manner of small suburban houses, not in our opinion of a style of the best taste owing to its massed effect. But there, at any rate, the youths of the world foregathered and contrived to bring joy and cheerfulness for a period of a fortnight. The small streets of the Olympic Village which bore names reminiscent of the battles of the last war, were renamed just before the Games. One had acted with too much candour ! In this village, the athletes from all over the world foregathered without distinction

of race, religion or politics in a great spirit of brotherhood, endeavouring to get to know each other better. These young men of today will be the guiding powers of tomorrow, when, in their turn, they will instil the meaning of the Olympic Spirit in the youths of their respective country, thus fulfilling their mission in the five continents of the globe. They will strive to check in its origin, the disease from which the world of today is suffering. They will have formed there long living friendships, unaffected by the presumption of politicians. Let us hope that the close bonds uniting the youth of the world, made in the Olympic Village of Melbourne, will have helped to serve better the cause of peace and friendly understanding between nations than all international conferences would ever do.

The Opening Ceremony

Shortly before 3 p.m., on November 22nd, a crowd estimated at more than 100,000 persons poured in the gigantic Olympic Stadium. The weather was fine and the sun shone fiercely. Following the band of the Air Force, the band of the Royal Navy performed, in full dress uniform : helmet and white cross-belts, navy blue sailors' jerseys and blue trousers with red stripes. They reached the Stadium in two groups formation, they paraded under storm of applause over the whole ground of the Stadium, executing intricate figures as only men specially trained for the Royal Parades at Buckingham Palace are capable of doing. While playing, the massed bands marched past forming the figures representing the five Olympic rings. During this striking parade, an aeroplane flew in circles over the Stadium, tracing the word ' OLYMPIC ' in white smoke in the blue sky. As soon as the naval contingent came to a standstill, the band of the Army appeared on the lawn in front of the Stadium. In the meantime, the twelve olympic heralds stood at attention near the Rostrum placed in front of the Royal Box. Sometime later an athlete pronounced the Olympic oath standing on the Rostrum.

At punctual 3 p.m., H. R. H. the Duke of Edinburgh arrived, riding in an open carriage and driving through the Marathon's Gate. The Duke walked slowly towards the Tribune of honour escorted by Mr. Rogert G. Menzies, Prime Minister of Australia, Avery Brundage president of the International Olympic Committee, the Hon. W. S. Kent Hughes, president of the Organizing Committee and Sir Frank Selleck, Lord Mayor of Melbourne.

At 3.30 p.m., according to the Protocol and the traditions used at the Olympic Games, the Greek Delegation paraded first, heading the 69 contingents of athletes present at the Games. The imposing Austra-

lian Delegation brought up the rear of the athletes parade, greeted by the frantic applause of the public. Thereafter, six officers carried the Olympic Flag with its five rings to the Stadium when, a few seconds later, the flag was hoisted on the main mast.

The Meaning of the Games

In his brief speech of welcome, the Hon. W. S. Kent Hughes said : "Your presence here is the irrefutable proof that the Olympic Flame is burning brighter than ever. The flimsy structure of civilization may sometimes be shaken by the storms and outbreaks of international misunderstandings, but the Olympic Spirit outlives these storms and is gaining in strength and radiance." The president of the Organizing Committee expressed his thanks to His Royal Highness the Duke of Edinburgh for having travelled half way round the world in order to honour with his presence the city of Melbourne and to perform the Opening of the Olympic Games. He begged him to convey to Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth "the warmest wishes of all those present to this memorable sport gathering and this festival of international goodwill". He also expressed his thanks to the president and the members of the International Olympic Committee "for safeguarding the high principles of the olympiads by transposing them into rules, this is certainly not an easy task."

The Hon. W. S. Kent Hughes went on saying : "Today, a new chapter, full of hopes, is added to the history of the Games. We are all the heirs of a fine and magnificent heritage. We offer our contribution to it with pride and humility not only in our capacity of heirs of a glorious past, but we consider the Olympic Movement as the means of building up a better future, May the Olympic Games of 1956 give to

mankind an ever increasing strength and new hopes in its fight and struggle to realize an ever closer union and understanding between men."

After the allocation of the Organizing Committee's president, Mr. Avery Brundage, president of the International Olympic Committee begged the Duke of Edinburgh to proclaim the Games officially opened. The traditional phrase was pronounced by the Duke at 4.33 p.m., immediately followed by fanfares of trumpets, while the Olympic Flag was slowly raised to the mast, the pigeons were released and flew over the Stadium.

To the sound of the gun, the Australian athlete, specialist of the mile RON CLARKE reached the Stadium, he was the last man who carried the Flame which had been conveyed through numerous relays from Athens.

He lighted the sacred Olympic Fire, the flame of which was burning throughout the Games. The Olympic Hymn was then performed by a choir of 1200 choristers accompanied by the band of the Royal Australian Air Force. The Rev. J. J. Brooth, Archbishop of Melbourne, advanced towards the Rostrum where he performed a short religious ceremony. The flagbearers of all the contingents advanced while

forming a semi-circle around the small Tribune erected on the lawn.

The Oath

It was on the Australian athlete JOHN LANDY, world champion of the mile, that befell the honour to pronounce the traditional oath on behalf of the athletes present, when he said :

We swear that we will take Dart in these Olympic Games in the true spirit of sportsmanship and that we will respect and abide by the rules which govern them, for the glory of sport and the honour of our country.

John Landy was escorted by the flagbearer of the Australian Delegation : Mac Millan, the 800 m. runner, while all the flags of the other nations were lowered to the sound of the national anthem of the organizing country. The public estimated at 103.000 persons began to move away while the athletes left the Stadium. At 5.40 p.m. the last Australian athletes departed. The setting sun cast its last shadows on the horizon after having overwhelmed by its scorching rays more than 200 people. Silence fell on the empty Stadium, thus the Opening Ceremony of the Games of the XVIth Olympiad came to an end.

Solemn Opening Ceremony of the 52nd Session of the International Olympic Committee

The 52nd Session of the International Olympic Committee held in Melbourne Town Hall, was opened officially on November 19th, in the presence of the members of the International Olympic Committee as well as the representatives of numerous international federations and of foreign Olympic delegations. Mr. Menzies, Prime Minister of Australia delivered the opening speech from a tribune where he took his seat, while twelve Australian swordsmen formed a guard of honour. In a humorous speech the leader of the Australian Government mentioned the sensational strides achieved these days in the world of sport by athletes all over the world : "It is even conceivable that someday, they will attain such pitch of perfection in physical fitness, that they will in one leap disappear from our sight in order to land thousand miles away, just in time to hear that in the meanwhile, their record has been beaten !" Mr. Menzies went on extending a hearty welcome to all olympic visitors and expressed his satisfac-

tion that the city of Melbourne was given the 'right' to stage the Games. In conclusion, Mr. Menzies said: "if it were not that I am the leader of the Government, I would certainly congratulate the Government of the Commonwealth for having cast aside for the time being, its fundamental principles and for having given its financial support to the scheme in such a generous manner."

After the performance of the Olympic Hymn which was sung by two hundred choristers, Mr. Avery Brundage, president of the International Olympic Committee delivered the speech which we are publishing in the present issue of the Bulletin.

Finally, the Governor of the State of Victoria declared the Session of the International Olympic Committee 'the supreme authority of the Olympic Games' open, thus the inaugural sitting came to a close at the sound of the *Coronation March* by William Walton.

The Closing Ceremony

December 8th, 1956... a memorable date. Immediately after the conclusion of the football final a military band in full dress

swung into the stadium to the strains of the *American March* by Souza. Simultaneously four field guns which were to fire the salute

in honour of the Olympic flag, entered by the Marathon Gate, towed by jeeps. The weather was grey and overcast, the fog had lifted but a heavy bank of clouds darkened the sky and it was cold in the arena.

The standard-bearers of the competing nations headed by the Greek flag marched into the arena through the Marathon Gate, each preceded by a shield indicating the name of the country. Each nation was represented by a man or woman athlete with the exception of Mexico whose flag was borne by the Olympic high-diving champion Joaquín Capilla, accompanied by a small delegation of five athletes. Within ten minutes all the standard bearers had formed up in a semi-circle facing the Tribune of Honour.

Thereupon, the athletes still present in Melbourne intermingled without distinction of race or nationality and paraded in mass formation in front of the flags, circled the arena once and took up their positions in the centre behind the flags. This was an innovation which brought variation to the protocol of the closing. *The athletes showed their friendship by clasping hands.* The flag-bearers then formed a semi-circle in front of the rostrum where the President of the International Olympic Committee was to pronounce the ritual speech which marks the closing of the Games. The Greek national anthem was played while the Greek flag was hoisted on one of the flagpoles where the emblems of the victorious athletes of the Games had been hoisted. Then followed *God save the Queen* whilst the Australian flag rose on the centre flagstaff. Finally, in anticipation of four years hence, the Italian flag is hoisted to the strains of the Italian national anthem, in honour of the next Olympic Games to be held in Rome in 1960.

Mr. Avery Brundage, President of the International Olympic Committee, accompanied by the President of the Organizing Committee, the Hon. Kent Hughes, and by the Mayor of Melbourne, mounted the rostrum and pronounced the closing of the Games in the following terms :

In the name of the International Olympic Committee I offer to H. R. H. The Duke of Edinburgh and to the people of Australia, to the authorities of the City of Melbourne and to the Organizing Committee of the Games, our deepest gratitude. I declare the Olympic Games closed and, in accordance with tradition, I call upon the Youth of all countries to assemble four years from now at Rome, there to celebrate with us the Games of the XVIIth Olympiad. May they display cheerfulness and concord so that the Olympic Torch will be carried on with ever greater eagerness, courage, and honour for the good of humanity throughout the ages.

The Olympic Flag (embroidered in satin and presented by the Belgian Olympic Committee), was then handed over by the President to the Mayor of the City of Melbourne who will keep it in the main public

Hall of the City until the next Games take place in 1960 in Rome.

Then the heralds proceeded to sound the fanfare of farewell. the Olympic fire went out slowly in the great copper vase where it had been burning since November 22nd. The choir sung the *Olympic Hymn* by Michel Spisak (performed for the first time in the Summer Games) while the huge Olympic flag was slowly lowered from the flag pole in the arena, heralded by a salute of five guns. Thereafter, six non-commissioned officers carried the unfurled flag from the Stadium.

To the strains of *Waltzing Matilda* which had been the sonorous background played throughout the Games and the Choir stirring farewell song, the flagbearers moved slowly from the Stadium followed by the athletes who still intermixed without distinction of class or nationality and dispersed casually followed by the military band who closed the procession. On the table of results, inscribed in neon lettering was the following message :

Melbourne bids you farewell, good journey and good luck in Rome.

Song of Farewell

(Specially written for the occasion of the Closing Ceremony of the Olympic Games, Melbourne, 1956, by William Tainsh.)

*Homeward, homeward, soon you will be going now ;
 Momok wonargo ora go-yai,¹
 Joy of our meeting, pain of our parting,
 Shine in our eyes as we bid you good-bye.*

*Good-bye, Olympians; good-bye, Olympians,
 (On comes the evening, west goes the day.)
 Roll up your swags and pack them full of
 [memories,

 [again ?"
 Sing in your hearts thro' the years yet to be.*

At the close of the song, the band will lead into the chorus of *Will Ye No' Come Back Again ?* The words are :

*"Will ye no' come back again
 Will ye no' come back again,
 Belter loved ye canna' be :
 Will ye no come back again ?"*

2000 athletes paraded hand in hand

The International Olympic Committee departed from tradition, when it asked the athletes taking part in the Closing Ceremony (A large number of them had already left Melbourne for their respective countries) to parade in brotherly fashion clasping hands, in order to give a living illustration, symbolizing the fact that *sport is above frontiers and outlives political divergences.*

This was a most beautiful and stirring inspiration. During this parade the following message was placed on the table of results :

The Olympic Competition of 1956 is over. May all those who witnessed return to their respective countries carrying with them the Olympic spirit.

The Olympic flame flickered out. It was 4.45 p.m., the Games of the XVith Olympiad of 1956 ended and became a part of history.
