Dear Mr. Mayer,

It is noted from Bulletin No. 84 dated 15 November 1963 that, on the back page dealing with World athletics from 1860 to 1960, Mr. Gaston Meyer, under the period 1959-1960, included Snell and Halberg along with Elliott in coming from the Australian Continent. It is felt that attention should be drawn to the fact that white Elliott is from Australia, Snell and Halberg are from New Zealand, which is a selfgoverning Dominion of the British Commonwealth with an area slightly greater than that of Great Britain and Northern Ireland, situated just over 1,200 Miles to the East of Australia and with a population of 2,5 millions approximately.
