BRUSSELS. From the 8th April, 1969, the new address of the French-speaking section of the *Office for physical Education, Sport and Open-Air Life* will be : 25, rue Archimedes, Brussels 4.

CORTINA D'AMPEZZO. *The prize-winners at the XXVth International Festival of Sports Cinema at Cortina d'Ampezzo*, in which 27 countries took part, were as follows : 1 - *"Rallye" (Italy)*; 2 - *"Final Games" (United States)*; 3 - *"There are only fellows in the sky" (USSR)*; 4 - *"The Snows of Grenoble" (France)*; 5 - *"Mexico 68" (Hungary)*.
