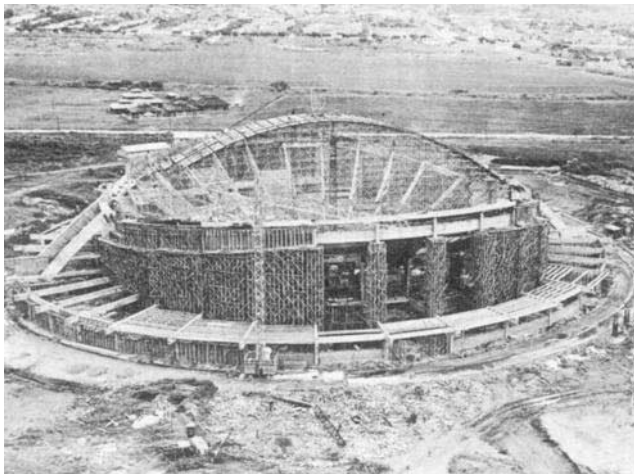


OTHER GAMES

* The Seventh *Jeux des Silencieux* (*Games of the Silent Ones*) were held at the end of January in Adelboden (Switzerland). Two hundred deaf-mutes from thirteen countries met face to face in alpine disciplines.

* Nineteen Asian nations participated in the Sixth Asian Games, which were opened on the 18th of December in Bangkok. Mr. Avery BRUNDAGE, President of the International Olympic Committee, was present. Mr. Willi DAUME, President of the Organizing Committee of the Games of the XXth Olympiad, presented invitations to the Games to the presidents of the National Olympic Committees of Asia.

The star of these events, in which two thousand athletes were involved, was the Formosan CHI CHENG, of whom Mr. Henry HSU, member of the International Olympic Committee for China, talks below.

At last World Champions

Not long ago it could be said with justification that although the Chinese might win a Nobel prize for any intellectual excellence, they couldn't hit the broad side of a barn in a ball game. In track and field and in baseball, at least, this is no longer the case.



The fastest girl on earth today is a Chinese lass named CHI CHENG, who holds no less than four world records in sprints and hurdles.

The 26-year-old speedster, who hails from Hsinchu, Taiwan, has shattered the domination of international track and field by Western girls.

In the Rose Festival Track and Field Meet on June 13, 1970, in Portland, Oregon, Miss CHI broke two world marks within 45 minutes. Dashing towards the final tape in the 100-yard sprint in 10 seconds flat, she cut an amazing 0.3 second off the old mark. Three quarters of an hour later, she ran the 220-yard in 22.7 seconds, bettering the old record by 0.2 second. This mark was further shortened by another 0.1 second by herself in California on the 4th of July.

At a Munich track meet on July 12, she set two more world records: 22.4 seconds for the 220-meter sprint and 12.8 seconds for the 100-meter hurdles.

Now a straight-A student at the California Polytechnic Institute, the 5 feet, 8 inch, 136-pound Miss CHI is working toward her goal in life: to win a few gold medals for China in the '72 Olympics before getting married and retiring to coaching.

China came close to an Olympic gold medal at the Rome Games of 1960, with the decathlon performance of C. K. YANG. He scored 8,334 points but finished 58 points behind Rafer JOHNSON.
