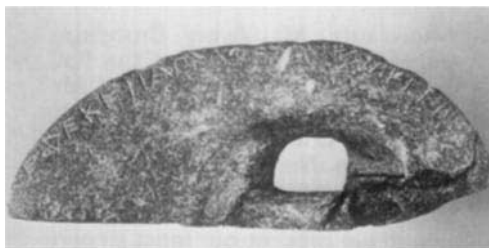


History (illustrated) of excavations at Olympia¹

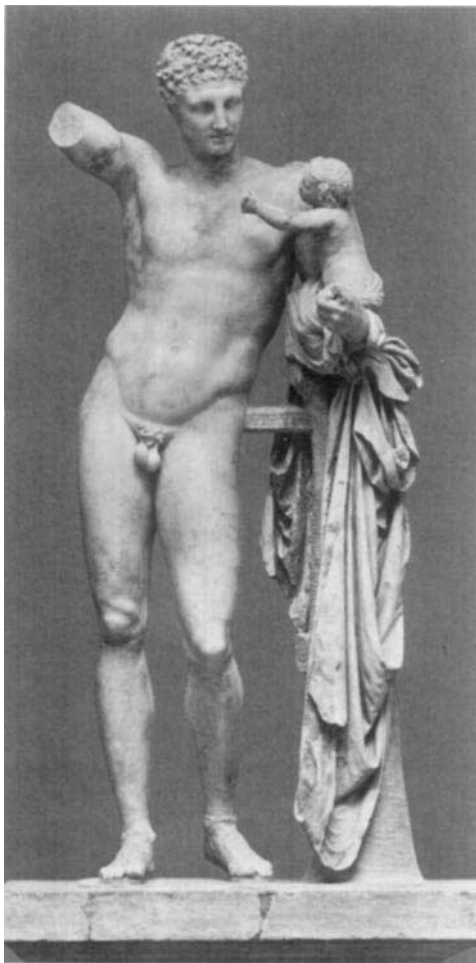

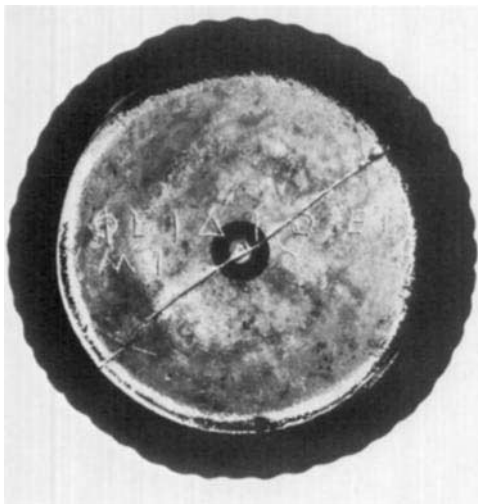
