

# Elections to the IOC Executive Board

## ● Major Sylvio de Magalhaes Padilha (Brazil)

Third Vice-President for the 1975-1979 period.

Born on 5th June 1909 at Niteroy (Brazil), he studied physical education, firstly at Springfield College (United States), then at the Royal Institute for Physical Education and Sport in Stockholm (Sweden). An accomplished sportsman, he was Brazilian basketball champion, Brazilian and South American athletics champion and recordholder (sprint and long jump). He twice took part in the Olympic Games—in Los Angeles in 1932 (110 and 400 m. hurdles), then in Berlin in 1936 when he was a finalist in 400 m. hurdles.

Head of the Brazilian delegations to the Olympic Games and Pan American Games since 1948, he naturally turned to sports administration, where he has held most important positions. Currently, President of the Brazilian Olympic Committee, he is also Vice-President of the Pan American Sports Organisation (PASO), President of the Regional Sports Council, Director of the Brazilian Wrestling Union and honorary member of the Brazilian Confederations of basketball, boxing, fencing and sport (CBD, 11 sports affiliated to the IFs).

Elected IOC member for Brazil in 1964, he became a member of the Executive Board in 1972, member of the Commission for the Olympic Programme (1972-1974) and of the Commission of Enquiry for Rhodesia (1973-1975).

Holder of many Brazilian and foreign decorations and titles, he was also awarded the Helms Trophy, attributed to the best athlete of the Americas.

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## ● Dr. Arpad Csanadi (Hungary)

Member of the Executive Board, elected for the 1975-1979 period.

Well known in international circles for his work at the head of the Commission for the

Olympic Programme, Dr. Csanadi was born on 23rd February 1923 in Hungary. He studied at the University of Budapest and then at the Hungarian College of Physical Education. He obtained a Doctor's degree in history.

A member of the national basketball team, he also practised football, his favourite sport, for the Ferencvaros TC team.

Member, then Secretary General of the Hungarian NOC and Vice-President of the Hungarian Physical Culture and Sports Union, he also held the post of President of many Organising Committees. It was in 1964 that he was co-opted IOC member for Hungary. Since 1967, he has been a member of the Commission for the Protection of the Olympic Emblems (1967-1972), and a member or President of several IOC Commissions. Finally, he was appointed President in 1968 of the Joint Commission for the Olympic Programme.

A sports author, his football encyclopaedia has been translated into 14 languages.

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## ● Mr. Masaji Kiyokawa (Japan)

Member of the Executive Board for the 1975-1976 period.

Born on 11th February 1913, this illustrious swimming champion graduated from the Tokyo University of Commerce. Gold medalist for 100 m. backstroke at the 1932 Olympic Games in Los Angeles, he also won a bronze medal at Berlin in 1936.

Becoming the national swimming coach, he accompanied the Japanese swimmers to Helsinki in 1952. In 1956 he was Director of the Japanese delegation in Melbourne.

A member of the Japanese NOC since 1945, it was in 1939 that he became a member of the Executive Board of the Japanese

Amateur Swimming Federation. Secretary of the FINA Swimming Technical Committee from 1956 to 1964, he then acceded to the post of Secretary of the FINA in 1964. In 1968, he was elected life honorary member of this federation. It was moreover in this capacity that he attended the 1960, 1964 and 1968 Olympic Games as an international judge, Assistant General Manager then General Manager for the swimming events at the Olympic Games.

He was elected IOC member for Japan in 1969.

● **New IOC Chief of Protocol:  
Maurice Herzog**

Mr. Juan Antonio Samaranch, IOC member for Spain and currently second Vice-President of the Executive Board, had announced his intention to give up the post of Chief of Protocol, to which he had been elected in 1968.

The 76th Session appointed Mr. Maurice Herzog, member for France, to replace him in this position.

Famous mountaineer, former Minister, statesman, Deputy Mayor of the town of Chamonix, author of well known books on mountaineering, Mr. Herzog was elected IOC member for France in 1970, at the age of 49, in place of the much missed Armand Massard. In 1973, he became a member of the Awards Commission.
