Mr. Pavle Lukac, Head of Press Services for the 1984 Winter Games was kind enough to send us the following news of the OCOG's activities.

- *Session of the OCOG*

The Organising Committee of the XIVth Winter Games in Sarajevo 1984 has held its 4th session. Among other things, the financing plan was adopted. After this plan the cost of the Games will be 157 million US dollars.

- *Bobsleigh and luge course plans approved*

The FIL and FIBT technical committee has adopted the technical documentation of the combined bobsleigh and luge course. The construction of this sports facility starts this spring, and the sporting use of the course will start in early 1983.

- *Athletes and judges prepare*

The preparation of the athletes and judges, as well as of the Organisers of the XIVth Winter Games in Sarajevo have been intensively progressing. Since early January 1981, many sports competitions take place on weekends in the following sports disciplines : Alpine skiing, cross-country and ice hockey. The last sport being a new sport in Sarajevo, it is raising more and more interest.

- *The World press and the Winter Games*

The Yugoslav press has devoted much space to publicising the XIVth Winter Games. Indeed, in the period January to October 1980 some 2,000 articles concerning the forthcoming Games were published.

In addition, the headquarters of the Sarajevo OCOG have been visited daily by foreign radio and television reporters, sports writers and journalists in general. Whilst most of the visitors are from those European countries intending to send athletes to the future Olympic town and its surrounding mountains for training purposes, even more interest in the Games is being demonstrated by other overseas journalists from nations who have yet to acquire a larger sports tradition.
