

CALGARY : RECOMMENDATIONS BY THE EXECUTIVE BOARD

REVISION OF THE CHARTER

A new working document will be prepared and sent to all members of the Board so that they may study it. This study is to be concluded on the 31st of May 1985 in Berlin.

ELIGIBILITY

Football: all players placed under the jurisdiction of the FIFA and its national federations recognised by an NOC, provided they are under 23 years of age, will be able to participate in the Olympic football tournament.

Tennis : the establishment of an upper age limit of 23 will be discussed with the International Tennis Federation (ITF).

Ice Hockey : the IOC President will discuss with the President of the International Ice Hockey Federation (IIHF) the question of eligibility of players for the Olympic tournament.

MEDICAL COMMISSION

– The analysis of the biomechanical and physiological study of the Los Angeles Games will be published in May, 1985.

–Beta blockers will be on the list of banned substances from now on. Blood-doping was also condemned.

– A new Sub-commission has been established. It will be made up of the chairman of the Medical Commission and the presidents of the five continental associations of NOCs.

– Agreement was given (in principle) to the plan for cooperation between the IOC and the WHO.

PRESS

The document on the "Minimum Requirements" was approved in principle. The members of the Executive Board will send their comments to Vidy before the end of April and a definitive document will be submitted for approval at the Session in Berlin.

The new accreditation forms, the new categories for written and photographic press and the working plan for accreditation for the 1988 Games were also ratified.

PROGRAMME

The International Curling Federation is included from now on among the International Federations

recognised by the IOC. A curling event will be organised at the Calgary Games as a demonstration sport. Still concerning the programme, the Executive Board approved the following proposals submitted by the IFs :

Speed skating :

– to introduce the women's 5000 m as a new event without increasing the total maximum number of competitors per NOC in this sport ;

– to raise from 3 to 4 the number of entries in the women's and men's 500 m, 1000 m and 1500 m without increasing the total maximum number of competitors per NOC in this sport.

Biathlon :

– to raise to 4 the number of entries in the 10 and 20 km events without increasing the total maximum number of competitors per NOC in this sport.

Ice Hockey :

– to raise from 20 to 22 the number of players per team.

ELECTION OF HOST CITIES FOR THE 1992 GAMES

The following procedure has been adopted :

Before the Session

– The letter addressed to the National Olympic Committees inviting the submission of bids will be sent out by the International Olympic Committee, following its approval by the Executive Board, at the beginning of March, 1985.

– the National Olympic Committees should inform the International Olympic Committee of the cities submitting an application to organise the Games of the XXVth Olympiad or the XVIth Olympic Winter Games and pass on to it the details of those in charge of the bid before the 15th May 1985. It is pointed out that one city only for the Winter Games and one city only for the Games of the Olympiad may be put forward by each NOC.

In order to ensure that all candidate cities are treated equally, the IOC requests that the bid committees, once they have official status, refrain from inviting to visit them any persons taking part directly in the election of future host cities for the

Games (see page 86 of the "Olympic Charter" : Conditions laid down for candidate cities). This does not, of course, apply to the official commissions of enquiry appointed by the IOC.

– All the documents making up the official application to be returned to the IOC (contract, minimum requirements for written photographic and electronic coverage and press, radio and television broadcasting, the minimum requirements of the International Federations, etc.) and which make up an integral part of the contract between the IOC and the host city for the Games, will be sent out by the IOC in **June 1985**.

– The candidate cities should provide their replies to the questionnaires and dispatch all the necessary documents to the members and the Headquarters of the IOC **by 1st March 1986 at the latest**

The 1st of March 1986 is therefore the absolute deadline for the submission of application presentations by candidate cities.

During the Session

– Each candidate city will have an hour to present its case to the members of the IOC and the representatives of the IFs and NOCs, who will then have the opportunity to ask questions. The presentation may include an audio-visual program.

– On **14th October 1986** there will be a draw to determine the order in which the reports of the candidate cities will be presented. The time and place will be specified later.

– The members of the IOC will then listen to the reports of each commission of enquiry (IOC, IFs, NOCs).

– The election will take place on the **17th October 1986** in Lausanne on the occasion of the 91st Session of the IOC, in the presence of the IOC members only.

– The ballots will be held in the following order :

1. Election of the host city for the XVIth Winter Olympic Games.

2. Election of the host city for the Games of the XXVth Olympiad.

– To be elected, a city should obtain the absolute majority of the votes of the members present.

One city will be eliminated after each round (the one receiving the least votes) until one of the cities obtains the absolute majority of the votes.

– The results of the intermediate votes will be posted up in the hall reserved for the IOC members and simultaneously in the Press Centre.

The final result will be passed by the scrutineers in a sealed envelope to the President of the International Olympic Committee. He will then repair to a room which will hold the members of the IOC, the representatives of the media and the representatives of the candidate cities.

– He will give first of all the name of the city elected for the Games of the Olympiad, then that of the city which will organise the Winter Games.

– Once the results have been announced, the duly accredited representatives of the cities will sign the contract binding them to the IOC.

CALGARY 1988

A number of decisions were adopted concerning the XVth Winter Games in Calgary, in particular as regards accommodation :

– the maximum price of 45 US \$ per day per athlete staying in the village was confirmed ;

– the OCOG is to provide the list of hotels reserved for the Olympic family and representatives of the media ;

– prices for the Olympic family and the media must be provided either in May 1985 or by the end of 1985 at the latest.

Lastly, the Calgary OCOG must provide the fullest possible details of the cultural programme at the Session in Berlin. The OCO '88 intends, moreover, to create a permanent Olympic sports museum following the Games.

The next reports of OCO '88 should concentrate more specifically on the description of the International Broadcasting Centre and Main Press Centre (the international feed should be transmitted to the Olympic village and the IOC hotel), on the transport system for the Olympic family and the media and the insurance to be taken out for the Olympic family.
