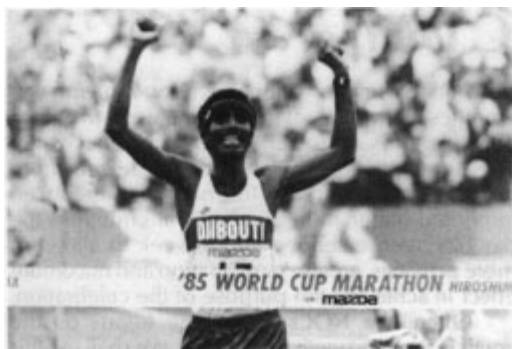

## FISA

The first Interregional Conference of the FISA Development Programme (as reported in our last issue) took place in Cairo (EGY) from 23rd - 26th March

1985. The FISA delegation was headed by FISA President Mr. Thomas Keller (SUI), who was accompanied by Vice-President Mr. Claus Hess, the Continental Representatives for Asia and Africa, Messrs. M.K.P. Singh Deo and Fayez Yakan respectively, the Head of the Commission for Competitive Rowing, Mr. Theo Körner, and Commission members, Miss Penny Chuter, Mr. James Joy and Mr. Thor Nilsen. Participants from EGY. ALC, GRE, IND, PAK, POR, TUN, and TUR represented FISA federations from the Greater Mediterranean area, and took part in fruitful negotiations which were conducted in a spirit of partnership. The conference was opened by the Egyptian Minister of Sport and Youth, Dr. Abdel Ahad Gamal Eldin, and was covered by Egyptian television. The conference was highlighted by the enthusiasm shown all all the participating countries for the new programme. and was a very informative exercise for the leaders of FISA in their planning of the future.

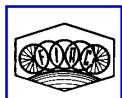

## AIBA

The USOC has entered the continuing debate over the safety of boxing. In response to an aggressive

campaign mounted by the American Medical Association which would like to see all boxing banned, the USOC has come out strongly in favour of amateur boxing. The USOC feels that the AMA has failed to take into account the clear differences between professional boxing and the carefully regulated and safety conscious aspects of Olympic boxing. The USOC points out that less than 1 % of amateur boxers ever turn professional. The USOC Chief Medical Officer, Dr. Robert Voy is direct in his feelings about amateur boxing : . . . *“we have trained officials and experienced physicians working inside and outside the ring. Moving the sport underground, which would result if a ban were created, eliminates this supervision. This is not ‘protecting the athletes at all’.”*



**FIAC**

The Amendment to Article 49 of the UCI General Regulations which is concerned with the minimum (60 cm) and the maximum (75 cm) diameters of bicycle wheels has been suspended until January 1 st 1986. The UCI has accounted this decision as it has charged its Technical Commission with re-examining the stipulation included therein.



**FEI**

The next Three-Day Event World Championships will be held in Gawler, South Australia from 22nd to 25th May 1986. The Organizing Committee have offered to subsidise 80 % of the costs of the air transport of horses from their point of departure to Adelaide and return. Competitors and team officials will be accommodated at Roseworthy College, approximately 14 km from Gawler.

General Jonathan Burton (USA) has been appointed Technical Delegate and Mr. Charles Frank (GBR) Foreign Veterinary Delegate.

The FEI have in mind to organise a World Equestrian Festival in 1990. The idea is to arrange the World Championships for all disciplines at the same time and at the same venue. At this stage it seems that three national federations, those of SWE, GBR and ITA, are interested in hosting the event.

*President : Mr. Roland Boitelle*

The new President of the Federation Internationale d'Esgrime (International Fencing Federation), Frenchman Roland Boitelle, wrote in last January's Olympic Review about his plans to "universalise" a sport which is not widely practised in Africa and Asia.

Born on the 31st December, 1924, in Saint-Mande, to the east of Paris, Mr. Boitelle joined the Saint-Mandeenne, a club he was to belong to all his life, in 1933. In 1975, he became its President and General Secretary for all sports. He discovered fencing in 1942, and gained international rank with the saber in 1948. From 1948 onwards he was an international judge and joined the Management Committee of the French fencing federation in 1958. He went on to become its Secretary General (1980) and President (1981-1984). It was in order to dedicate himself more freely to his international activities that he chose to relinquish the latter post. Mr. Boitelle was captain of the French team for twenty-two years, from 1954 until 1976. Member of the referees' Commission within the International Federation since 1970, he joined the Comite National Olympique et Sportif Français as Secretary General in 1982. Today, he is also a member of the French candidature committees for the 1992 Summer Games (Paris) and Winter Games (Albertville). Mr. Boitelle, a retired director of the French Electricity Board, is now a full-time sports official : he admits that he scarcely has the time even now to fulfil all his important missions.

Mr. Boitelle is a Knight of the Order of Merit and the Legion d'Honneur.

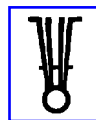


FIFA

It was in Rotterdam (HOL), where the first Gymnaestrada took place in 1953, that homage was paid to this passionately committed partisan of gymnastics. In the presence of representatives of the Dutch Government, the Dutch Sports Federation, the national and regional gymnastics organizations and the FIG, the President of the FIG, Mr. Yuri Titov(URS), thanked and congratulated the founder of the Gymnaestrada, and presented him with the FIG's insignia on stained glass panel and flag. 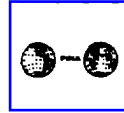

Mr. Lopez delivered a lecture to the attending IIHF delegates which dealt particularly with future training colleges for coaches, players and referees.

A collection representative of the FIL was exhibited during OLYMPHILEX '85 and was on display again during the XXXIVth FIL Congress, held in Berchtesgaden (FRG) from 2nd to 5th May 1985.

□ In the course of its meeting held in Vienna (AUT) on 23rd and 24th March 1985, the Praesidium of the FIL were addressed by the President, Mr. Bert Isatitsch (AUT) on the subject of the future of the FIL in a speech entitled "Concentration and Co-responsibilities". The President will present a further exposé to the next Congress. One of the matters that will certainly be discussed is future rules and regulations for television and film coverage of luge events. During the meeting, the praesidium unanimously decided to apply to the IOC for the inclusion of luge on natural tracks in the Olympic programme.

UIPMB

The 1985 Biathlon Congress was held in Ruhpolding (FRG) on 15th February. During the congress a number of important decisions were taken. It was decided that in future a decision concerning the organizers of World Championships must be made four years in advance of the respective championship. In future the UIPMB will pay for doping control during World Championships, and such controls will now be introduced to World Cup competitions and again be paid for by the UIPMB.

The UIPMB has introduced an upper limit on the cost of accommodation at World and European Cup competitions. This will be set at \$30 a day.

The UIPMB intends, providing that there is the necessary input of information by member federations, to publish, monthly, "UIPMB News".



ISU

The ISU intends to organize a special Pair Skating judges' seminar, to be held in Davos (SUI) on September 21st and 22nd, 1985. The seminar will be sponsored by the ISU, which shall be responsible for all the administrative arrangements.

The Judges' Examination for candidates for appointment as ISU Championship Judges, as well as for present Figure Skating judges and referees,

will be held in London (GBR) during the St. Ivel Ice International, scheduled for September 24th-26th, 1985.

The World Indoor Short Track Speed Skating Championships for Men and Women were held in Amsterdam (HOL) from March 15th to 17th, 1985. The competitions were dominated by skaters from JPN who took all the titles. Results are as follows :

□ The ITF Management Committee held a two-day meeting in Paris (FRA) on April 10th and 11 th. During the meeting the Committee took a number of decisions which will be referred to the ITF General Assembly, to be held in London in July, for ratification. Amongst these decisions were the following :

- From 1986, no boy or girl, sixteen years of age or under, will be admitted to the professional circuit. International competitions for children of twelve years and under will be abolished.
- An African zone for the Davis Cup to be created in 1986.
- Fiji Islands became the 120th member of the ITF registered.



#### ITF

The International Tennis Hall of Fame, the organization based in the elegantly restored Casino in Newport, Rhode Island (USA) has announced the names of three more great former players who will be inducted as members during the tournament there in July 1985. They are An Jones (GBR), Fred Stolle (AUS) and Arthur Ashe (USA).

In addition to honouring great players from the past, the International Tennis Hall of Fame, which is open all year round to visitors, also recognises from time to time those who have made an outstanding contribution to the game in a non-playing capacity. In this regard they unanimously decided to bestow membership posthumously on David Gray (GBR), former General Secretary of the ITF, for the services he rendered to the game.



#### FIVB

The FIVB has recently incorporated a number of specialist commissions into the framework of the future development of the federation. The five commissions all met during January 1985. They are as follows : Refereeing Commission, Rules of the Game Commission, Technical Commission (to prepare education programmes and the necessary teaching, promotional and informational materials), Sports Organization Commission and the Medical Commission. The latter will concern itself in particular with anti-doping controls, sex verification and checks on referees.

The draw for the 1985 Junior World Championships took place on the 10th April in Milan (ITA) in the presence of the President of the FIVB, Mr. Ruben Acosta, the President of the Italian Federation, Mr. P. Florio, the organizers and the town authorities who will play host to this event.

The eliminating rounds are scheduled from 11 th to 13th September, the semi-finals for the 16th and 18th September, and the finals for the 21st and 22 September.



**IYRU**

IYRU Secretary General, Mr. Nigel Hacking (GBR), spent five days during March in Korea. President Beppe Croce (ITA) unfortunately had to cancel his trip after he underwent an operation from which he is now rapidly recovering. Mr. Hacking spent his time spread between Seoul and Pusan (site of the 1988 Olympic Yachting events). During his visit he met with Mr. Chan-Wook Park, Director General of sports for the SLOOC, and with Admiral Ko, Vice-President of the Korean Yachting Association. The Mayor of Pusan assured the party that preparations are now well-advanced and that the planning for the event is of the highest quality. There will be a joint approach from the SLOOC, the KYU and the IYRU to Olympic Solidarity with proposals for courses to be run between now and the Olympic Games.

President Croce, accompanied by IYRU Vice-President Jonathon Janson (GBR) and Mr. Nigel Hacking attended the Princess Sophia Cup held in Palma (ESP) over the Easter weekend. All Olympic classes were raced during the meeting and the prizes were presented by H.M. King Juan Carlos.



**IWF**

In the course of its Executive Board meeting held in Milano (ITA) on 2nd and 3rd March 1985, the IWF took the following decisions with regard to doping, in order to preserve the purity, integrity and moral standing of their sport.

- Not only the users, but anyone who promotes, advertises, sells or is associated with forbidden substances, will be severely punished. The minimum period of suspension for guilty parties will be two years.
- The Executive Board will decree which events will be recognised with regard to World Records. A precondition will be the presence of one or two members of the IWF Special Doping Commission. Such controls to be carried out under his authority. In such cases the analysis will be undertaken in an IOC-accredited laboratory, which must be located outside the host country.
- Suspensions will not in future be reviewed before eighteen months after the date on which the suspension began.

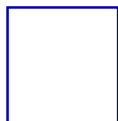


**IBA**

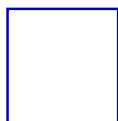


### IOF

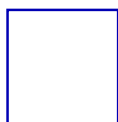
