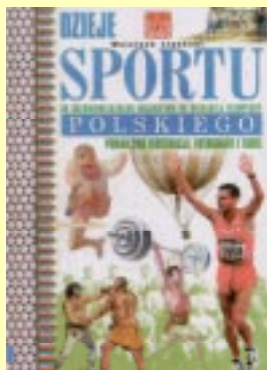


# BIBLIOGRAPHY

## History of Polish Sport

by Wojciech Liponski, published by Wydawnictwo Podsiadlik-Raniowski i Spolka, ul. Zmigrodzka 41/49, 60-171 Poznan (Poland). 1997. 64 pages in Polish.

This book is written primarily for children under the age of 14. The author, a lecturer at the International Olympic Academy, invites them to discover the Olympic Movement through the history and highlights of Polish sport, its leaders and its athletes. Illustrated with a large number of photographs and etchings, this work also contains chapters on Baron Pierre de Coubertin, Olympism and the Olympic Games in general.



## The Annals of the Pre-Olympic Games Period - Athens 1895-1896

by Thanassis Tarassouleas, published by Chrysoula Kapioldasi-Sotiropoulou. 1997. 124 pages in English. With a draw of 1,500 copies in Greek and English, this work contains previously unpublished documents on the period preceding the Games of the I Olympiad in Athens in 1896. The minutes of the meetings of the first Greek Olympic Games organizing committee for the period 16 January 1895 through 16 March 1896 are reproduced, reflecting facts of

great historical, social and cultural significance. The author recalls the pioneers of the Olympic Movement, Evaggelis Zappas, William P. Brookes and Pierre de Coubertin. This reference book is illustrated with photographs and original free-hand drawings of the Olympic champions, which are being published here for the first time.



## Modern Olympic Games - Story of the first one hundred years

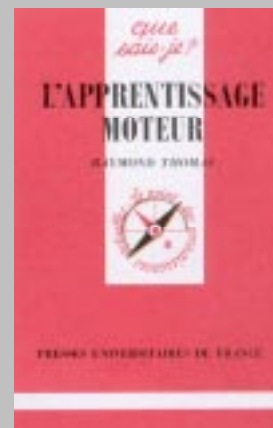

This publication, written in the national language of Sri Lanka, traces back the history of the great moments in the modern Olympic Games. As well as the life and challenges of Baron Pierre de Coubertin, reviver of the Games, it contains portraits of Olympic champions such as Jim Thorpe and Carl Lewis, and includes a history of Sri Lanka's participation in the

Olympic Games. This reference work concludes with a list of all gold medallists since 1896.



## L'apprentissage moteur

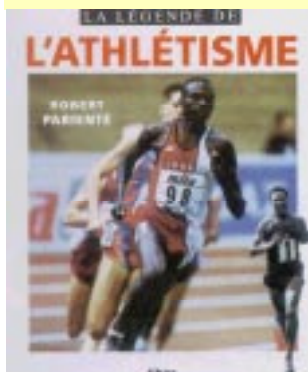

The author, a professor at the Université de Paris X, describes the basic findings of research conducted in the field of motor skills development. The growth of sport and the contrant improvement of performances have led scientific researchers to take an interest in competition sports. some trainers and coaches want a scientific basis for their techniques, and physical education instructors are also interested in theoretical findings that will help them improve their ability to teach.

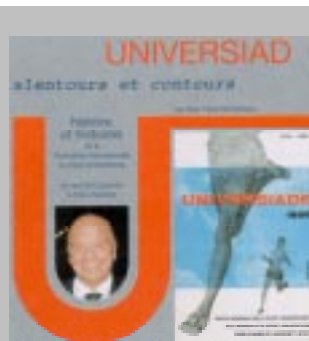
## La légende de l'athlétisme

The legend of athletics") by Robert Parienté, Editions Liber, Geneva (Switzerland). 1997. 224 pages, in French. Formerly a journalist with *L'Equipe*, Robert Parienté has produced an exhaustive and historical work made up of one hundred portraits of champions - men and women - who have placed their stamp on the first hundred years of international athletics, from the Games of the I Olympiad in 1896 to the most recent World Championships in 1997. From Spiridon Louys to Daniel Komen, from Paavo Nurmi, Jesse Owens and Fanny Blankers Koen to Serguei Bubka, Merlene Ottey and Marie-José Pérec, the reader will find personal portraits of these outstanding athletes, who have performed great feats on the five continents. The text is illustrated by over 200 documents and supplemented by a word-record table, results and an index.



## Universiade Alentours et Contours

("Around and about the Universiade - History and stories of the International University Sport Federation, from Coubertin to Primo Nebiolo") by Gian Paolo Ormezzano. 1996. 107 pages in French. The author, who is a sports journalist, has produced a book on the many facets of the activities and history of the International University Sport Federation (FISU). A



book of facts, figures in sport, anecdotes and major happenings, it also contains beautiful and important illustrations of different university sport events, sportives universitaires.

## 110e anniversaire FIG - Objectif An 2000

("FIG's 100th anniversary - Objective 2000"), published by the International Gymnastics Federation (FIG), 10 rue des Oeuches, Case postale 359, 2470 Moutier 1 (Switzerland). 1991. 283 pages in French, English and German. Readers will enjoy reading about the past history of the International Gymnastics Fed-

eration in this reference book, which is richly illustrated with full-colour photographs. It also includes a number of essays on the future of the sport.



## FIBA Media Guide 1997-98

published by the International Basketball Federation, PO Box 700607, 81306 Munich (Germany). 1997. 396 pages in English.

This seventh edition of the FIBA Media Guide contains complete and detailed information on the history of the FIBA, the national federations, world and continental championships, the specialized press, etc. The national federations' e-mail and Internet addresses are included for the first time.



## Sport 98

by Hugo Steinegger, published by the Swiss Olympic Association, Haus des Sportes, Laubeffstrasse 70, Postfach 202, 3000 Bern 31 (Switzerland). 1998. 448 pages in French and German. Price: 28.30 SF. This 26th edition of the official Swiss sports directory

contains a complete chronicle of the 1997 year in sport, statistical data and a sporting events calendar for 1998. Illustrated with many colour photographs, this manual offers information about more than 80 disciplines and provides a list of useful addresses.
