Colombia

In collaboration with the Colombian Olympic Committee, the University of Bogota has set up a School of Specialization in Advanced Sports Studies, the aim of which is to encourage the human development of participants through sport and, from a more practical point of view, to attain the level of sporting ability Colombia needs as it

begins the 21st century. The studies programme, designed especially for students from the faculties of Physical Education, Journalism, Social Communication, Sports Sciences and Administration, lasts for two academic semesters, at the end of which students can obtain the title of Specialist in Advanced Sports Studies.

The occasion was marked by the presentation of the AOE

30th Anniversary Prizes: the Citius prize was posthumously awarded to Carlos Ferrer, COE president and IOC member, the Altius prize to baroness Güell, COE member, and the Fortius prize to IOC President Juan Antonio Samaranch. The AOE board of directors was received by its honorary president, H.R.H. the Prince of Asturias, while the AOE also celebrated its 32nd Session at the University of Santander on the theme "Sport and Literature; from Homer to Alberti".
