The "Ciudad de Alcobendas" first prize for painting was awarded to José Doménech Sánchez for his work entitled *Apuntes*, while the "FIBA" second prize went to Emmanuel R. Garibay for

One on One. Soledad Pulgar Garcia's *Vibración* and Santiago Arangoa Ibañez's *Basket Scape 3/40* received special mention. In the sculpture category, the "Comunidad de Madrid" first prize went to the artist Ramón Orlina y Gahol for *Basketball mi mundo*, while the "Albertino de Figueiredo" second prize went to Manuel Mateo Cuenca for *La Jugada del entrenador*.
