ASSH STUDENT PRIZES

These prizes are for quality work by tertiary or secondary students in the general field of sports culture. Appropriate areas of focus are: sport and economics, sport in history, law, literature, philosophy, politics, social psychology and sociology. Sports culture and tradition should be seen as being broad, not confined.

The **ASSH Dissertation Prize** is awarded to an Honours thesis written within the past 3 years. One (returnable) copy should be submitted. The prize is \$100 and a one year's subscription to ASSH. The winning dissertation may be published as an **ASSH Study in Sports History**.

The **ASSH Essay Prize** is awarded to an essay written within the past 2 years. The maximum length is 4,000 words and two copies should be submitted. The prize is \$100 and a one year subscription to ASSH. Other prizes may be awarded at the discretion of the judging panel. The winning essay will be published in the ASSH Bulletin.

All entries should be sent to Dr. Wray Vamplew, Economic History Discipline, The Flinders University of South Australia, Bedford Park, South Australia, 5042. The deadline for submission is 19 December each year.

1987 PRIZE WINNERS

Leonie Randall's prize winning essay, "Was the Professional Sportsman in Britain between 1870 and 1914 less a labour aristocrat and more a wage slave", is published in this Bulletin. Leonie has recently gained her First Class Honours degree in History at Flinders University. She also won a University Medal for being the best Honours Student in the School of Social Sciences.

The winner of the ASSH Dissertation Prize is Mark Connellan for his B.Ed. (Honours) Physical Education thesis (1985) undertaken at the University of Sydney entitled "The Ideology of Athleticism, its Antipodean impact, and its manifestations in two elite Catholic schools".
