The organising committee invites you to attend the 20th International Congress of Historical Sciences (CISH), at the University of New South Wales (UNSW), Sydney, Australia, in July 2005. The CISH Congress is held every five years, and this will be the first time ever outside North America and its European base.

The program and structure cater to all historians regardless of their field. The programme will consist of three major themes, 28 specialised panel sessions and over 20 round tables. CISH Internal Commissions and Affiliated Societies will also meet under the umbrella of the Congress. The Australian Historical Association will convene a two-day meeting during the Congress. The official languages of CISH are French and English, and simultaneous interpretation will be provided for the Major Themes.

In addition to the educational program there will be an opportunity to network with your peers at a variety of social functions. Previous CISH Congresses have been attended by over 2000 delegates from dozens of different countries. A full tourist programme and accommodation booking service will be available.

The Organising Committee, chaired by Professor Martyn Lyons (UNSW) comprises representatives from Sydney metropolitan universities, the Australian Historical Association, the Mitchell Library, the History Council of New South Wales, the State Records Authority of NSW, and the ABC Radio Social History Unit.

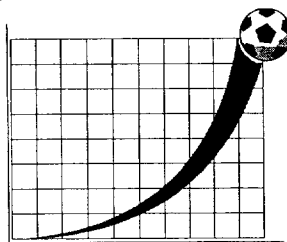
