

FROM THE SOUTH

MRS. ROLAND H. BARLOW of the Merion Cricket Club won the Women's North and South championship at Pinehurst, beating Miss Sarah Fownes, Oakmont Country Club, in the final by 3 and 2.

Mrs. Barlow and Mrs. Dorothy Campbell Hurd tied for the medal for low score in the qualifying round and on the play-off another tie resulted. On the next attempt to settle the issue, Mrs. Hurd won by a single stroke, with a 93 to Mrs. Barlow's 94.

JAMES M. BARNES, of the Sunset Hill Club, St. Louis, won the North and South open championship at Pinehurst with a total of 298 strokes for the 72 holes, M. J. Brady, of the Oakley Country Club was second with 300, Patrick Doyle, of Deal, and Robert G. MacDonald of New Evanston being next in a tie at 301.

CHAS. HOFFNER, of the Philmont Country Club, had the best round of the tournament, with a 32, 39-71.

Walter Hagen, Oakland Hills, the former title-holder, finished in ninth place with a score of 310.

Mr. Edward Styles, Washington Golf and Country Club, had the best score of the amateur contingent, being in fourteenth place with a 319.

THERE WERE NO LESS than 244 starters—a matter of about 60 more than had ever taken part in this event before—in the qualifying round of the North and South amateur championship at Pinehurst.

Mr. Albert J. Mendes, of the Siwanoy Country Club, was the medalist with a total of 81,79-160, one stroke in front of Mr. Edward Styles and Mr. James D. Standish, Jr., in a tie for second place with a total of 161. Mr. Mendes was assisted by doing the ninth hole 380 yards on Number Three course in 2. Mr. Irving S. Robeson of the Oak Hill Country Club of Rochester, the 1918 title-holder, finished in tenth place with 169.

The final resolved itself into a battle between Mr. E. C. Beall, Uniontown, and Mr. F. C. Newton, The Country Club, Brookline, the former having disposed of, in turn, Mr. L. A. Hamilton, Garden City, by 1 up; Mr. I. S. Robeson, 4 and 2, and Mr. J. M. Wells, Kenilworth, by 2 and 1, while Mr. Newton beat Mr. F. D. Danforth, North Fork, by 8 and 7; Mr. Dickenson Bishop, Dowagiac, by 5 and 3 and Mr. Franklin H. Gates, Moore County, by 2 and 1. The final, at 36 holes, resulted in a win for Mr. Beall by 4 up and 3 to play.

In the Beaten Eight division Mr. Styles beat Mr. Donald Parson, Youngstown, in the final by 5 and 4. The Second Sixteen flight went to Mr. S. E. Sharwood, Merion, who beat

Mr. E. L. Scofield in the final by 3 and 2.

MR. C. F. WATSON, JR., of Baltusrol, won the qualifying round in the mid-April tournament at Pinehurst with 41,39-80, Mr. E. C. Beall, Uniontown, being next with 40,42-82, followed by Mr. E. L. Scofield, Woodway, with 83, similar figures being registered by Mr. F. C. Newton, Brookline, and Mr. H. V. Seggerman, Englewood. In the final Mr. Scofield beat Mr. Seggerman by 4 and 3.

In the Beaten Eight division Mr. H. C. Fownes, Oakmont, beat his club-mate Mr. Tom Morrison, in the final by 5 and 3.

IN THE FINAL of the Florida Winter championship which was played at the St. Augustine Links, Mr. Louis J. Hopkins, Old Elm Club, beat Mr. Henry M. Crane, Nassau, by the large

margin of 11 up and 10 to play, 36 holes.

THE Greenbrier tournament at White Sulphur Springs was won by Mr. Oswald Kirkby, Englewood, who beat Mr. Rodman Griscom in the final by 2 and 1. Mr. Henry J. Topping, Greenwich, was the medalist in the qualifying round with a 77.

THE SECOND annual tournament of the West Virginia Golf Association will be played at the Edgewood Country Club the week beginning June 30. The first event was held at Fairmont in July, 1916, but owing to the war no tournaments have been held since.

THE SEVENTEENTH annual amateur championship of the Southern Golf Association will be played at the New Orleans Country Club on June 24-28 inclusive.
