Answer.—Batter is not credited with a sacrifice fly, except when his fly scores a baserunner.

Will you tell me if this is a triple play, owing to it being continuous?

Answer.—This is decidedly not a triple play, but is a double play, owing

to the bonehead baserunning of the man who was occupying first when the ball was hit. The runner originally on third scored, as, after the shortstop made the play at third, the runner going home could not be forced, therefore he had to be touched out.
