In November 1990 the National Olympic Committee of Germany announced the establishment of the German Olympic Institute in the Wannsee area of Berlin. The Institute, under the direction of Dr. Herbert Haag, is a meeting, study and research center devoted to physical education and sport science, with special reference to Olympic questions and themes. The Institute has planned a meeting on December 9-12, 1993 in Berlin for representatives of Olympic Study Centres and Institutes currently established throughout the world. This is to be Stage II of organizing a World Network of such Centres. The Proceedings of Stage I (held in Seoul in 1991) were reported in Volume I — 1992 of *OLYMPIKA*, pp. 170-171.

Pertinent to “The IOC and the World of Interdependence” by Donald Macintosh and Michael Hawes (see *OLYMPIKA*, Volume I — 1992), the editors regret an error in transcription from the original manuscript text to the article’s published version. In reference to negotiations between North Korea and South Korea on the possibility of organizing certain Olympic events in the North, the quotation at the top of page 38, “dialogue of death,” attributed to Richard Pound, at the time Executive Vice-President of the IOC, should have been correctly published as “dialogue of the deaf.” The editors apologize to the authors and to Richard Pound for this error.
