FDU COACH CLAIMS \$1 MILLION PRIZE

Ethan Zohn, a former USISL player who coaches the goalkeepers at Fairleigh Dickinson University, walked off with the \$1 million grand prize in CBS's "Survivor: Africa" television show.

Zohn, 27, outlasted 15 rivals in the "reality" game, claiming the top prize during the Jan. 10 finale in Los Angeles.

The 16 contestants spent 39 days last summer in Kenya's Shaba National Reserve, forging alliances while developing a cooperative society and competing in "challenges" for rewards. One by one, players were voted off the reserve until Zohn defeated retired Colorado schoolteacher Kim Johnson in the final on a vote by seven ousted competitors.

Zohn, a Lexington, Mass., native, was part of the 1997 and 2001 U.S. Maccabiah soccer teams.

Zohn, who helped Fairleigh Dickinson's men reach the quarterfinals of the NCAA tournament last fall, said he hopes to use some of earnings to start a soccer program for inner-city youth.
