

Longtime assistant **Mike Freitag** will take over the **Indiana** program in 2004. He will replace **Jerry Yeagley**, who is retiring after 31 years. Freitag, Yeagley's assistant since 1993, starred at Indiana. Yeagley had an 538-101-44 record entering the Big Ten tournament. IU needed six wins for Yeagley to tie former San Francisco coach Steve Negroesco's Division I record of 544 wins.

**Old Dominion's** perfect season came screeching to a halt with losses to James Madison, 3-2, and George Mason, 1-0, in CAA action, but worse for the Monarchs, star defender **Trevor McEachron** was lost with a dislocated kneecap after a collision with GMU keeper John O'Hara and starting defender **Ian Kaila** went down with an ACL tear against JMU.

First-year Scottish keeper **Stefan Gonet** has been sensational for **Binghamton**, leading NCAA Division I with a 0.34 goals-against average. Entering the America East final against Northeastern, Gonet had eight straight shutouts and a school record 15 shutouts. He had not allowed a goal in the first half all season.

Six college players were on the 22-player Canada team that traveled to Turkey for final preparations before the World Youth Championship. Three **Syracuse** players — goalie **Alim Karim**, defender **Richard Asante** and midfielder **Francesco Bruno** — were picked. Also on the U-20 list were goalie Josh **Wagenaar [Hartwick]**, defender **Winston Marshall [Wright State]** and midfielder **Josh Simpson [Portland]**.

Jamaican **Khari Stephenson** is the latest in a recent line of Jamaican players to star in college soccer. Stephenson had 15 goals in 14 games for Division III power **Williams** before leaving for Jamaica's Olympic qualifying series against Guatemala. Stephenson, a senior, is expected to attract considerable interest from MLS clubs at the 2004 SuperDraft.

**Simon Boddison** resigned as head coach at **Wisconsin-Green Bay** after eight seasons. The Phoenix was a national power in the 1970s but has struggled in recent years. Boddison had a 48-85-13 record during his tenure. UW-Green Bay was 3-13-1 in 2003.
