147 VS. CARVER.

A Complete Resume and Full Scores of the Recent Six Matches Shot in the West Between These Two Famous Experts With the Gun.

Dr. Carver and J. 147, L. Winston shot six matches at Chicago on John Watson's grounds. In the first place Carver offered to wager \$100 to \$47 that Winston could not win a match from him in six days.

In last week's issue we gave the scores in full of the first and second match, which took place on Dec. 19 and resulted in a victory for 147, by winning both of them.

Carver won the next four matches, and in order to show the scores complete we will print the six matches in full. Following are the scores:

MATCH NO. 1.

Table with columns for match number, date, and scores for Carver and 147.

147 lost the 10th, a left quartering outgoer; the 17th in same direction, the 22d, a right curving outgoer; the 28th, a driver, slightly on the left, and the 45th, in about the same direction.

Carver lost the 7th, a curving right quarterer; the 26th, an incomer on the left, which fell over the line; the 32d, a sharp left quarterer, also dead outside; the 39th, an incomer on the left; the 42d, an outgoer, and the 44th, a left quartering incomer. The second match.

147 lost the 9th, a sharp one on the right; the 33d, a right quarterer, dead outside, and the 40th, a curving left incomer.

Carver lost the 1st, a left quarterer; the 7th, a straightaway; the 12th, a curving left quarterer; the 23d, a driver; the 33d, a left quarterer; the 36th, a sharp one on the left, the 44th, a curving incomer on the left, and the 50th, a driver slightly on the left. Carver had four fall dead outside, and 147 had one.

DEC. 21ST, THIRD MATCH.

Carver lost the eleventh, sixteenth and thirty-seventh, left quarterers, and the twenty-second, an outgoer.

"147" lost the seventh, seventeenth and twenty-sixth, left quarterers; the sixth and thirtieth, right quarterers, and the forty-sixth, a curving right quartering incomer.

FOURTH MATCH.

Carver lost the first, a zig-zag outgoer, and the twenty-sixth, an incomer on the right.

"147" lost the first, eleventh, thirteenth and twentieth, all curving incomers; the twenty-sixth, a left quarterer; the thirty-fourth, a curving incomer; the thirty-eighth, and forty-seventh, both incomers, and the forty-fifth, an outgoer.

DEC. 22, MATCH NO. 5.

Carver lost five right quartering, twisting drivers.

"147" lost three outgoers, three left quarterers, two right quarterers and three incomers.

MATCH NO. 6.

Carver lost the fourth, thirtieth and forty-third, all left quarterers; the seventh, an outgoer, and the thirty-second, a right quarterer.

"147" lost the seventh, fourteenth, twentieth, twenty-seventh, thirty-eighth and forty-third, all left quarterers; the sixteenth, thirty-first and thirty-sixth, out-

goers; the twenty-sixth, thirty-third and forty-seventh, incomers on the right or left.

From the 300 birds Carver killed 270, an average of 90 per cent.; "147" killed 254, an average of 84 2-3 per cent.
