McPherson Defeated in a Match at One Hundred Birds.

The shooting match between McPherson and A. H. King on Jan. 10 at the Herron Hill Gun Club grounds, Pittsburg, Pa., was well attended, and it was won by King. Each man shot at 100 pigeons, and King won by six birds, the score being 91 to 85.

During the day an agent of the Humane Society appeared on the grounds, but he was soon convinced that there was nothing there that he could find fault with. He was presented with a large bundle of dead pigeons.

The contest showed that McPherson was a little out-classed, and that King should at least have conceded him five birds or a handicap of two yards. A handicap of this kind would have made the contest an exciting one. The score is as follows:
