A MID-WINTER TOURNAMENT AT KANSAS CITY.

Barton Lewis Made Best Average on Flying Targets—Budd Won Hazard Live Bird Trophy—Omaha Defeats Kansas City—Details and Scores.

Kansas City, Mo., Dec. 21.—Editor "Sporting Life"—The midwinter tournament held at Bob Elliott's Blue River Shooting Park, this city, opened Thursday morning with 30 contestants on hand.

On the first day only seven events were finished, the balance being carried over until Saturday. The best score was made by Barton Lewis, a young shooter from Norborne, Mo., who made his first appearance in fast company.

The Hazard Powder Co.'s live bird championship trophy shoot commenced promptly at 10 A. M. on Friday, with 23 entries. Each man shot at 25 live birds, \$25 entrance, birds included, money divided Rose system, 7, 5, 3, 1; handicap rise. A set of Ford live bird traps were used.

The tie for the trophy between Budd and Parmelee was shot off on Saturday, Budd winning by killing five straight, Parmelee losing his fourth dead outside. Mr. Ben Norton, of the Hazard Powder Co., then presented the cup to Mr. Budd and invited the sportsmen present to "join him" in the club house.

The team match between wing shots of Omaha and Kansas took place on Saturday with ten men on a side. The match was shot by a man from each team shooting a 25 bird race together. This made it more interesting as well as a greater test of nerve.

Russell and Budd Divide the Holiday Handicap.

The Christmas Day programme of the Keystone Shooting League attracted a large crowd of marksmen and their friends to the grounds at Holmesburg Junction, Pa. The marksmanship was fair, considering the heavy fog that came off the river, and which hovered over the traps, taking the birds anything but easy marks.

Two events were shot off, the first being at fifteen birds, handicap rise, \$10 entrance. The second event was at seven birds, handicap rise, \$2.50 entrance. Thirteen men entered in the first event, and Hood Waters, a crack shot from Baltimore, was placed at scratch, 30 yards. Fitzgerald and Geikler were the closest men, 27 yards. The birds were remarkable, considering the dull weather, and only two of the thirteen entries finished with straight scores, E. J. Russell and L. W. Budd being the fortunate ones.

In the seven-bird event the shooting was more even, and at the finish no less than six were tie for first honors. Herbert, Hobbs, Bowers, James, Budd and Anderson were the men to kill straight. A peculiar coincidence occurred between Russell, Geikler and Landis. All of these marksmen had clean scores until the last bird, when the latter two missed their pigeons, while Russell's fell dead out of bounds.
