TRAP AT WILMINGTON.

Hawkins High in a Complimentary Shoot of the Wawasetts.

Wilmington, Del., March 16.—A complimentary shoot was given in honor of J. Mowell Hawkins and J. A. R. Elliott, by the Wawaset Gun Club, on Tuesday, at which a large crowd was present. Besides the regular events Edward Banks was called upon to defend the State championship against W. M. Foord. In this race Banks broke 90 to Foord's 87 and holds the trophy.

In the complimentary shoot J. Mowell Hawkins made high average, repeating his performance at the complimentary shoot at Dover the day previous. His score was 118 out of a possible 125 targets. A. B. Richardson, of the Dover Gun Club, made second high average with a score of 114 while W. M. Foord and Lester German, of Maryland, tied for third honors with scores of 113.

Fred Stone, the original "Scarecrow" in the "Wizard of Oz" production, now playing in Philadelphia, was present and demonstrated that he is not slow at smashing clay targets, for he broke 100 out of a possible 125.
