Carlisle, Pa., March 25.—The live bird and target shoot held by the Carlisle Gun Club March 24 was quite a success, sportsmen from York, Dauphin, Franklin and other counties being present. Among those present were State Senator Goodcharles, of Northumberland County, who is fast forging to the front as one of the big men at Harrisburg, and ex-Prothonotor and ex-Democratic County Chairman Allen M.
