The United States Revolver Association has announced the result of the annual indoor championship shoot, which was conducted March 20-25, inclusive, at New York, Chicago, Pinehurst, N. C.; St. Louis, Pine Bluff, Ark., and San Francisco. The winner is S. F. Sears, a member of the police force of St. Louis, his score being 461. This was a very hard match on account of the large number of entries and reflects great credit upon the skill of Mr. Sears and also upon the ammunition he used, which was Winchester factory loaded cartridges. Des Moines, Ia.—At the Iowa State shoot, March 14-16, W. Heer, of Concordia, Kan., first general average, 594 out of 600, an average of 99 per cent., shooting New E. C. (Improved). Fred Gilbert, second general average, 590 out of 600, shooting Du Pont. W. R. Crosby, third general average, 588 out of 600, shooting New E. C. (Improved). C. G. Taylor, of Meckling, S. D., first amateur average, 581 out of 600, shooting New E. C. (Improved). On the 16th inst., both Mr. Heer and Mr. Gilbert broke the entire

program for the day, 200 targets, not missing a single one. Mr. Heer's longest run for the tournament was 307. F. A. Weatherhead, of Red Oak, Ia., won the L. C. Smith cup with 40 straight, using Du Pont. W. D. Stannard, of Chicago, won the cup for the expert average, to be shot off by those who broke 94 per cent. or better during the tournament, with 50 straight, shooting Du Pont. Mr. Heer and Mr. Crosby were second, with 49 each, shooting New E. C. (Improved). C. B. Adams, of Rockwell City, Ia., won the second average cup for the 90 to 94 per cent. men, breaking 47 out of 50, shooting Infalible. F. H. Lord, of Chicago, won the cup for those who shot below 90 per cent., breaking 42 out of 50, shooting Du Pont and E. C. The handicap event for the Iowa State Sportsmen's Association badge was won by N. W. Layman, of Des Moines, Ia., 48 out of 50, from the 19-yard mark, shooting New Schultze, and tied with Fred Gilbert, who stood at 22 yards. On the shoot-off, at 25 targets, Mr. Layman broke 23 to Mr. Gilbert's 22. Mr. Gilbert had a run of 157 straight, Mr. Crosby one of 147 and W. D. Stannard one of 104.

CINCINNATI GUN CLUB.

Good Scores Made in the Ninth Peters Trophy Contest.

Cincinnati, O., April 11.—On Saturday the monthly shoot for the Peters trophy among members of the Cincinnati Gun Club had a good entry, and scores averaged higher than usual. Twenty out of twenty-eight went 80 per cent. or better, and seven were 90 per centers. Randall, Bleh and Hesser were high on number of actual breaks, 47 out of 50, but with handicaps added nine men had a possible 50.

In the team races Gambell and Faran put up a good score, each smashing 46 out of 50.

Superintendent Gambell was taken completely by surprise at the last regular meeting of the board of directors by its generous action. They called him into their sanctum and notified him that they had decided to show him how his services to the club were appreciated, and accordingly they had by a unanimous vote decided to present him with \$200 to allow him to take a well-earned vacation. It took the superintendent some little time to get his wits together for a reply. He was well aware of the present board being satisfied with his services, but never suspected them of showing it in so substantial a manner.

Crabtree, of this city, secretary of the United States Revolver Association, has announced the result of the annual indoor championship shoot, which was conducted March 20-23, inclusive, at New York, Chicago, Pinehurst, N. C., St. Louis, Pine Bluff, Ark., and San Francisco. The revolver championship was won by S. F. Sears, of St. Louis, with a score of 461. Dr. R. H. Sayre, of New York, was second, with 438,

and William G. King, of Chicago, third, with 431.

The State championship winners are as follows:

Arkansas—Pistol, R. Swartz, Pine Bluff. Illinois—Revolver, Edwin L. Harpham, Chicago; pistol, William J. Griez. Missouri—Revolver, S. E. Sears, St. Louis. New York—Revolver and pistol, Dr. Sayre. North Carolina—Pistol, Miss M. Waterhurst, Pinehurst. The cup, presented in 1901, has now been won by Dr. Sayre three times and becomes his permanent property. Mr. Sears, the revolver champion, was also first last year. The shooting was done indoors by artificial light at a standard American target, distance twenty yards, five shots per man.
