TRADE NEWS.

Mr. C. A. Young, representing the Peters Cartridge Co., shot at Bryan, Texas, March 14. He was in fine form and scored 97 per cent. On the previous day, at Hearn, Texas, Mr. Young broke 96 per cent. Every shooter at this last tournament used Peters loaded shells. At Eagle Lake, Texas, March 21, Mr. Young scored 50 straight, in spite of wind, rain and darkness. On March 22, at Wharton, Texas, Mr. Young scored 98 out of 100 before a large number of people, who applauded him heartily for his remarkable work. Mr. H. W. Cadwalader, representing the Peters Cartridge Co., has been recently taking in a number of Illinois tournaments, and has invariably given a good account of himself, making friends for his company and bringing about a sort of spring awakening among trap shooters. Recently at Mason City, Ill., he was high man, with an average of 95 per cent. The regular shoot of the Dalton, O. Gun Club was held on February 23, the members contesting for the Hunter Arms Co. badge. Mr. Harvey Santmeyer won the badge with the excellent score of 37 out of 40, being 19 out of 20 singles and 18 out of 20 doubles. Mr. Santmeyer used Peters Premier shells, to which he ascribes a goodly share of the credit.

Consistent shooting is the result when Winchester factory loaded shells are used, as is shown by the averages of Crosby, Gilbert and other crack shots. At the Omaha, Neb., shoot, March 20, 21, 22, Fred, Gilbert won high professional average for the three days with a score of 580 out of 600 targets. At the St. Joseph, Mo., shoot, March 23, 24, 25, Fred, Gilbert and W. R. Crosby won first and second professional averages with scores of 588 and 573 respectively out of 600 targets. At the Missouri and Kansas League tournament, held in Kansas City, March 28, 29, 30, Fred, Gilbert and W. R. Crosby won first and second professional averages respectively, with scores of 560 and 556 out of 600 targets. At St. Paul, Ind., March 30, John S. Boa won the professional average with score of 144 out of 150; and H. H. Jeffers with a score of 140 won the amateur average, both using Winchester gun. At Janesville, Wis., March 30, the first three general averages were won by W. D. Stannard, P. H. Lord and H. W. Vietmeyer, respectively, all using Winchester factory amateur average by F. L. Pierstaff, all using Winchester factory loaded shells. At LaGrange, Ill., April 1, Lon Fisher, using Winchester factory loaded shells, won the amateur handicap cup.

Mr. Thomas, of Tampa, Fla., won every event and prize at the two days' shoot held at Bellaire, Fla., March 15 and 16. He not only won the cup offered for the high average for the entire tournament but also won the championship of South Florida. This is the second time Mr. Thomas has shot his Lefever gun. At Larned, Kansas, an amateur standing at 20 yards shooting his Lefever ejector gun, won high average over both professionals and amateurs. The account of the shooting done by Dr. E. F. Gleason, of Boston, sounds very much like the best professional shooting, but Dr. Gleason is a simon-pure amateur. On March 17, in the match between the Boston Athletic Association and the Yale University Gun Club, he scored 48 out of 50 and had previously made a like score in

practice. He then went with the B. A. A. to New York for the match with the Crescent Club, March 18, where he made a new record for the Crescent Club grounds, shooting 110 targets straight. In the two days' shooting he broke 347 out of 360 targets. Dr. Gleason always uses Winchester factory loaded "Leader" shells, which perhaps explains his good work. The shoot at Des Moines, Ia., March 14, 15 and 16, developed some of the most remarkable shooting seen for a long time. W. R. Crosby and Fred, Gilbert each made a straight run of 200. The experts' average was won by W. D. Stannard, who in the shoot-off made a straight score of 50. All the above shooters used Winchester factory loaded "Leader" shells.

Fred Gilbert's performance at Des Moines, Ia., is certainly very creditable and a remarkable showing. For the three days, March 14, 15 and 16, Mr. Gilbert broke 192, 198 and 200 straight, out of a program of three events, 200 targets each. At Omaha, March 20, 21 and 22, Mr. Gilbert scored 191, 192 and 197 out of a possible 200. At St. Joseph, Mo., on March 23, 24 and 25, Mr. Gilbert made three scores of 196 each out of a possible 200. Mr. Gilbert's run of 239 at Des Moines in two days is a remarkable performance, and speaks volumes for the Parker gun. In the history of trap shooting the score of 200 straight in a program event has only been made three times, and Mr. Gilbert holds credit for two of these. All of Mr. Gilbert's shooting has been done with the Parker gun, and he uses no other. Mr. R. E. Stout, of Magnolia, Del., at the Dover Gun Club, March 27, broke 19 out of 20 singles and 18 out of 20 doubles. Mr. Stout was high man and his shooting was done with the old reliable Parker Gun. LeRoy Leach, of Bonesteel, South Dakota, has issued a challenge to all fancy rifle shots, including Toepperwein, Malona, Chase, Baker, Bartlett, Hardy, VanAllen, Carter, or any others who think they can shoot a rifle at flying targets. The conditions named by McLeach are to meet at Omaha, Neb., May 20, and shoot at 2000 yard discs, 2 1/2 inches in diameter, using a .22 short solid ball cartridge, at a measured rise of 15 feet, the targets to be thrown by hand. Each contestant is to post \$100 and the best man takes the pot. Mr. Leach has posted \$100 with the editor of the "Sportsmen's Review," of Cincinnati, and all acceptances must be in the above editor's hands by May 5. Here is a chance for the fancy rifle shots to find out who is the real champion. They are all champions now.
