THE IFF GUN CLUB TOURNEY.

A. Sizer Carried Off the Honors For Two Days' Shooting.

St. Marys, Pa., June 6.—Editor "Sporting Life."—The second annual tournament of the Iff Gun Club was held at St. Marys on Thursday and Friday, June 1 and 2. This club added \$500 in cash and merchandise. The shooting was over two magazine traps, which worked to perfection. The shooting ground of this club is located quite near town, on a hill, which is easy of access. The back ground is all sky line.

On Thursday, June 1, the programme called for 3-15, 4-20 and 3-25 bird events, ten events in all, making 200 targets for the day. On this day event No. 10 was a team shoot for a \$40 cup, conditions 5-man team, 25 targets per man, 125 targets to the team. The DuBois Gun Club, of DuBois, Pa., and the Iff Gun Club, of St. Marys, Pa., were the only clubs that entered teams for the cup race, the winners being the DuBois Gun Club with 110 breaks.

On Friday, June 2, the programme called for 11 events, 200 targets in all. One of the 25-bird events was a merchandise affair with 35 merchandise and 15 money prizes. In the merchandise event Mr. A. Sizer, of Kane, Pa., was the only one to break 25 straight.

On the first day 40 shooters faced the traps with 31 shooting through the programme. High average went to H. W. Millen, of DuBois, Pa., with 190 out of 200; second to A. Sizer, of Kane, Pa., with 189; third a tie between C. W. Hart, of Buffalo, N. Y., and J. Mowell Hawkins, of the W. R. A. Co., each breaking 185, and fourth a tie between F. P. Mason, of Olean, N. Y., and F. Ginzburg, of DuBois, Pa., each breaking 184.

On the second day 36 shooters took part with 25 shooting through. High average went to A. Sizer with 185 out of 200; second C. W. Hart with 184; third a tie between H. B. Bozard, of Alleghany, N. Y., and J. Mowell Hawkins with 183 each, and fourth H. W. Millen with 180.

The general average for the two days resulted as follows: first A. Sizer 374 out of 400; second H. W. Millen with 270; third C. W. Hart with 369, and fourth J. Mowell Hawkins 368.
