#### TRAP IN NORTH CAROLINA.

##### Second Annual State Shoot Held at Durham—Mr. Collins' Great Shooting.

Durham, N. C., June 17.—Editor "Sporting Life."—The second annual tournament has passed into history for the trap shooters of this State, and everyone had a good time. It is a pleasure to meet with old friends and to form new acquaintances. Everything was as smooth as any tournament could be run and George Lyon, as president, and Arthur Lyon, secretary, with the assistance of John Todd and C. M. Cresswell in the office, it could not be otherwise than a success.

The blackbird traps and targets were used and proved very satisfactory. Three sets of traps were used. The weather was ideal for shooting, with the exception of the first day and you will not often find a warmer one than it was. The second day was much better, an occasional shower would cool everything off and did not interfere with the shooting. It is right hard to find a good ground to run three traps at once in this part of the country, but it was done here, and the background in front of every trap was very good.

Mr. Collins, an amateur from Due West, S. C., was the wonder of all shooters and visitors present. He made a run of over 100 in the first days shoot, closing with 197 out of 200. Heer, Crosby or Gilbert could not do better here. His second day's record was not quite as good, but he managed to lead for high average over all contestants by 8 targets. He carried away a beautiful silver pitcher for his good work. Mr. English, of Bristol, Tenn., was second high amateur; Jas. I. Johnson, of Raleigh, N. C., was third. In the professional class Walter Huff and J. Mowell Hawkins tied for first high average; J. W. Hightower was second and Emory H. Storr was third. Storr has been making some good records this season, improving over his last year's scores. By the time he grows a little taller he will be at the top of the ladder in trap shooting.

The trade representatives present were: Emory H. Storr and J. W. Hightower, of the Peters Cartridge Co.; Col. J. T. Anthony, U. M. C. Co.; J. Mowell Hawkins, of the Winchester R. A. Co.; Walter Huff, of DuPont Powder Co.; H. K. Ellyson and R. W. Simpson, of the Austin Cartridge Co. Missionaries: E. W. Sanford, U. M. C. Co.; R. M. Sanders, of the Winchester R. A. Co. A silver loving cup was given to the high professional average and was won by Walter Huff and J. Mowell Hawkins. How they divided it I did not learn. For second high professional J. W. Hightower came in for a \$5.00 gold piece.

The next annual meet of the Association goes to Wilson, N. C. The following officers were elected: W. W. Sims, president; Selby H. Anderson, secretary and treasurer.

Sixty shooters participated in the tournament. The following States gathered in North Carolina.

The attendance from Virginia was unusually good and we appreciate their coming and hope to reciprocate the pleasure of attending their State tournament. The following States were represented here: Virginia, Georgia, South Carolina, Tennessee and Maryland. At the last annual Trap Shooters Association of Virginia a silver trophy was given by the Peters Cartridge Co., to be contested for annually by a team of ten men from Virginia and North Carolina. Virginia won it last year at Richmond, Va., by two targets. They came to our State tournament determined to maintain their ownership and carried it back with them after winning it by twenty-nine targets. Virginia scored 853, North Carolina 864.

The championship of North Carolina

was contested for on the last day and won by J. E. Crayton, of Charlotte, N. C. Mr. W. T. McCarmick, of the same club won the championship last year. The Charlotte Club can furnish about the best team in the State. The trophy that goes with the championship was given to the Raleigh Gun Club by George Lyon, for the championship of the state, and was turned over to this association this year. Last year it was won by Mr. Lyon at the Raleigh Gun Club tournament, but not for the championship of the State. It becomes the property of the winner when won twice in succession.
