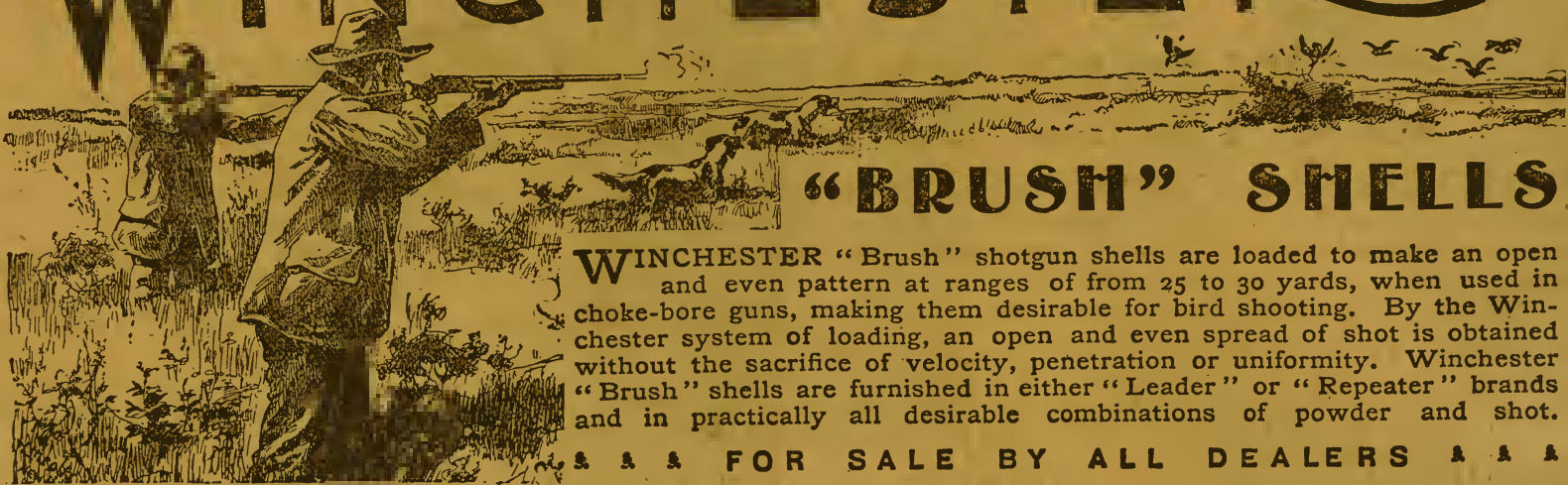

### TRAP AT SCOTSDALE.

#### The Enterprise Gun Club Won a Good Team Match.

Scottdale, Pa., Aug. 10.—The shoot held at Scottdale last Saturday under the auspices of the Scottdale Gun Club was a complete success in every particular.

The five-man team shoot between the Scottdale and Enterprise Gun Clubs was the principal event of the day, and the Enterprise boys won, the score being 215 to 204. The program called for seven events, the first three at 15 targets, the fourth at 20 and the last three at 15 each, making a total of 110 targets. The third, fourth and fifth were the five-man team race, which gave each contestant 50 targets to shoot at. In these events none of the Enterprise boys broke under 40, while two Scottdale men got less.

Wesley Hale was high man for the day, he having broken 99 out of 110; Calhoun 96, McFarland 95. W. H. Chain and A. B. Kelly each 94. A return match will be shot on the Enterprise grounds some time in September. After the day's shooting was over, R. S. Denniker, the old war horse from Ruffsdale, resting his arms on his trusty gun, announced that the Ruffsdale Gun Club would hold a shoot and picnic at Dillinger's Grove, at Ruffsdale, on Friday, Aug. 18, beginning at 10 A. ### Cecil County Tournament.

Rising Sun, Md., Aug. 12.—Editor "Sporting Life":—The fifth annual Cecil County Tournament for Amateurs will be held here on Oct. 18 and 19, under the auspices of the Rising Sun Shooting Association. Mr. H. Linn Worthington, the Delaware and Maryland representative of the Winchester Repeating Arms Co., will manage the shoot, and the successes of the past four years should be sufficient guarantee of the success of this year's effort.

Last year in two days we threw 20,000 targets and had a big field of shooters, who enjoyed two days of good shooting and had a good time. The club is one of the strongest organizations of its kind in Maryland, and the members are good

sports, who will do everything in their power to give everyone a good time and square treatment.

The shoot will be run on the system of allowing 1 cent for each target thrown, same to constitute a purse, which will be divided among those who shoot through the programme and fall to win their entrance. This plan seems to be the only one in which every man is absolutely sure to get his money back, and a shooter can shoot through the entire programme and be assured of its costing him nothing but his shells, even if he can't shoot a little bit. ### The Springfield Programme.

Springfield, Mass., Aug. 12.—The Springfield Shooting Club will hold one of its popular all-day shoots at targets on Labor Day, Sept. 4. The program calls for 200 targets, \$16 entrance in the sweeps, \$50 added money. All shooting will be from 16 yards. Targets will be thrown from two sets of Expert traps, arranged Sergeant system, Interstate rules to govern. Lunch will be served on the ground. Loaded shells will be for sale at the club house. The shoot will be held rain or shine, the shooting stand being under cover. Targets included in all entrances at 1½ cents each. Professionals and paid experts allowed to shoot for targets only. Shooting will begin promptly at 9 o'clock, and continue all day. To the amateurs making highest average, shooting the entire program, a list of 35 prizes are offered.

The prizes include Marlin rifle to first, Columbia graphophone to second, Colt pistol to third, Smith & Wesson revolver to fourth, Stevens rifle to fifth. Other prizes are umbrellas, boxes of cigars, hunting knives, dress suit cases, gun cases, subscriptions to sportsmen's journals, etc. The total value of prizes amounts to more than \$150.

Purses divided Rose system, four moneys, less than ten entries, three moneys. To reach the grounds take Indian Orchard or Palmer cars to Red House Crossing, grounds one minute walk from car. Ship guns and ammunition, prepaid, to C. L. Kites, secretary, 416 Main street, and they will be delivered on the grounds free of charge.
