TRAP AT MARIETTA.

The Ohio Valley Sportsmen's League Meet.

Marietta, O., Sept. 20.—In the team match shot here on Monday between the Marietta Gun Club and the St. Marys Gun Club, the former won, defending the trophy of the Ohio Valley Sportsmen's League. The day was marked by showers which kept the attendance to a smaller number than it otherwise would have been. Speary, of the Marietta team, led in the shoot for the cup with a score of 24 out of a possible 25 and also took first money in the 200 target event. In the shoot for the individual championship of the association, Speary, of Marietta, Dinsmore, of St. Marys, and J. F. Mallory, of Parkersburg, tied for first place with a score of 24 out of a possible 25. On account of the lateness of the day they did not shoot off the tie, and Speary still holds the honor, having won it at St. Marys last month.

In the shoot for the cup there were only two teams, Marietta and St. Marys. Other clubs failed to send full teams on account of the weather, being under the impression that the meet would be postponed. Out of a possible 125 Marietta made 113 while St. Marys scored 104. New Jersey Game Prospects.

Newark, N. J., Sept. 20.—Every indication points to a successful hunting season in New Jersey this year. Reports from points along the coast show a large number of water fowl. Woodcock, which were permitted to be killed in July, cannot again be legally taken until October, while the season for hare, rabbit, quail, partridge, grouse, English or ring necked pheasant, and gray, black and fox squirrels does not open until November 10. The season for shore birds, surf or bay snipe opened May 1 and they may be legally taken for the balance of the year. With the exception of quail, New Jersey can boast of an abundance of game and many gunners from neighboring States will soon be enjoying much sport. The \$10 license fee required of non-residents does not apply for water fowl, snipe or mud hens.

TRAP AT HERNDON.

Fred Coleman Led the Amateurs in a One-Day Shoot.

Herndon, Pa., Sept. 21.—A very successful one-day shoot was given by the Herndon Gun Club, September 19. Fifty-two contestants made a lively list and the club received many compliments from the visitors for the completeness of arrangements and the able manner in which the events were conducted. Five professionals were in attendance as follows: Edward Banks, representing the E. I. DuPont Co.; J. M. Hawkins, representing the Winchester Repeating Arms Co.; Frank E. sectivorous birds and birds out of season. The evidence showed they had killed hundreds of robins and black-birds. Each was allowed to pay a fine of \$15 and costs, amounting to about \$200. It is known that the Italian laborers at Avondale and Glen Mills quarries partly live on the birds they kill.
