### CULVER LEADS AT N. Y. A. C.

#### Finishes With 94 in First Half of Club Championship Race.

New York, May 9.—Missing only six targets in a hundred, Dr. D. L. Culver led the rest of the New York Athletic Club gunners at Travers Island on May 7 in the first half of the 200-point competition for the annual club championship title. Dr. Culver registered one perfect score on his third trip to the traps and in each of his other three strings broke all but two of the clays that were sprung for him. Four of the 19 experts who participated in the shoot succeeded in returning scores of 90 or better. Of these C. W. Billings showed the best form late in the competition, losing only two targets in the last 75 he aimed at. Mr. Billings' mediocre start in the first string, however, when he broke only 19 out of 25, cut his total score down to 92. M. V. Lenane was third with 91, and Dr. H. J. Thielman fourth with a card of 90. "Fred" H. Schaeffer, the present champion, failed to shoot up to his usual standard, his effort of 89 placing him fifth among the contestants. The summary:

### ANDERSON'S HIGH SCORE.

#### Professional Breaks 74 Straight and 97 Out of 100 Targets.

Richmond, Va., May 5.—The Richmond Gun Club had a most interesting shoot on April 30, with fourteen shooters on the firing line, and the best scores of the season were made. Judging from shooting so far this season, the local shooters will push the experts for high honors. The new trap ordered by the club was used, but unfortunately, one of the castings broke, due to faulty construction, and delayed the game. Anderson was high gun, with 97 out of 100, with two straights of 25 each, and a run of 74 without a miss, which is a better score than is usually made by a professional. His score is the high mark for the season, and professionals and amateurs will have to shoot some to excel this remarkable showing. Lawrence won second honors, with 93 out of 100, with one straight of 25, and a run of 35 without a miss, and 49 out of 50. His score was far better than the scores made by the average amateur. Remington continues his good work, and each shoot shows an improvement over the previous shoot. Mr. Harris, a new shooter, made his first appearance at the traps, and made an exceptionally good score, and with practice and coaching will make a good shot. The scores:

#### Registered Shoot of Pennsylvania Club Furnishes Fine Results.

### CLEVELAND'S REGISTERED SHOOT.

#### D. A. Upson Finishes High Over All in Two-Days' Contest.

Cleveland, O., May 5.—The Cleveland Gun Club held a two-day registered shooting tournament on April 29 and 30 that proved most successful in every particular, even in spite of weather that was far from ideal. It was the occasion of the annual Spring tournament and the shooters were keyed up for good scores. The first day's program called for 200 targets and the second for 180. High honors over all for the two days went to Dennis A. Upson, the noted Cleveland amateur, who topped all classes with 362 out of 380 targets. F. G. Bills headed the professionals with 185 the first day and 174 the second for a total of 359 for the tournament. Nearly two-score gunners contested for the prizes, a number representing out-of-town clubs. Six professionals were entered in the events. The high gun honors for the first day were captured by D. A. Upson, who shattered a total of 188 out of a possible 200 targets. In four of the events he made perfect scores, his low mark coming in the third, when he broke only twelve of the fifteen targets. W. Webster won the second high prize with a total score of 184, making clean sweeps in four events. J. A. Gilchrist finished third with a score of 183 and George Volk fourth, with 182. Several of the professional shots made higher scores, F. G. Bills breaking 185 targets and W. Henderson 183. Nine shooters tied in scores in excess of 180. In the doubles, W. Webster hung up the best mark, smashing eighteen out of the possible twenty targets. Blakeslee and Foltz both hit the clay birds for a score of 17. On the second day Upson finished on even terms with Bills, with 174. Woolfolk Henderson, a professional, was next with 172, while Poltz and Flick, amateurs, each broke 170 and Volk, Webster and Campbell 169.
