Frank Cantrell Leader at the S. S. White Target Shoot—Lindeman Wins Shoot-Off in Meadow Springs Event—The Clearview Club Shoot.

Philadelphia, Pa., September 19.—By consistent shooting, Frank S. Cantrell on Saturday nosed out a classy field of S. S. White members at the monthly shoot for the Thomas Nelson trophy over the Holmesburg Junction traps. This is a 100-bird race, shot every three months. Cantrell's actual score of 97 breaks was made by some of the finest shooting of the season. Newcomb gathered in 94. The competitors for the club spoons were unusually keen, and Cantrell and F. P. Harkins each carried off two dippers, the former one for high actual score and one for class A, and the latter two, one for runner-up and one for best score in class D for the club challenge cup. ## NEW KIND OF SHOOTING.

Hawaiians Try Skill at Flying Fish With Shotgun.

Honolulu, August 25.—Editor "Sporting Life":—Imagine trying to hit an animated white flyer with a shotgun during an earthquake, when the target goes out of the trap unknown anglewise, and plumps down out of sight within a thirty-yard flight; also that you don't know where the trap is located. Imagine all that, and you have some idea of what it is like to bang number seven after flying fish. Talk about the easy marks aeroplanes make! Forget it! and go out some morning after fish on the wing. You will then be in a position to talk understandingly after that. A new sport has just been born, and Waikiki Bay, Hawaii, is its birthplace. For the first time in the history of field and gun have flying fish been flushed with a power launch and shot on the wing. It was a brand-new experience in the hunting line which promises to win many devotees in short order. Taking pot shots at fish on the wing is sport of first water; affording plenty of exercise in the good sea air, giving the opportunity for quick shooting, providing for the employment of all the alertness contained within a man, and—being not too hard on the quarry. The idea came to Jack Young only a few weeks ago. He has been plying the waters of the bay at all hours of the day and night for many years, and had grown accustomed to seeing the

out of the water as his launch plowed past. But day after day the sight of these fish scurrying ahead of the launch interested him, and the idea was born: "Shoot them on the wing," he thought. The young boatman made a few preliminary experiments as his time permitted, and satisfied himself that he had discovered a sport that would discount ordinary trapshooting a hundred per cent. So yesterday morning, just as the sun was peeping over the frowning wall of Diamond Head, his launch chugged out of the channel with the pioneer expedition to the shooting grounds. In this party were W. J. Lynch, of Chicago, passenger traffic manager of the New York Central Railway system; M. F. Ihmsen, general manager of the Los Angeles "Examiner"; H. P. Wood, W. L. Morgan and R. O. Matheson, of Honolulu. There was a nice little chop to the sea. The motion failed to shake the nerves of the gunners, however, and a sharp watch was kept for the first school. This came with a great scurry of blue wings just as the boat swept around the last channel buoy and headed towards the sun, the fish taking to the streak that the sunshine made in the water. From that time on the shots came

and the dip net came into commission. For three hours the sport was kept up, the best combination of land and sea sport yet discovered. With shark fishing there is likely to be more disappointments than successes. With flying fish shooting there is almost a certainty of sport. Besides this, these beautiful little birds of the sea, ranging from ten to fifteen inches in length, are very tasty eating. The native Hawaiians catch them for this purpose by the thousand. Their method of doing this is interesting as it is successful. As many canoes as possible are pressed into service, which form a large half-circle about the school. The fishes are then driven before the advancing boats by a vigorous beating upon the water, into the nets spread to intercept them. The flying fish always remain near the surface, and may be driven in this manner for a long distance. When the fish are stopped by the net, the ends are quickly brought around together, and the catch is scooped up by the canoe load.

Clarksburg, W. Va., September 17.—The seventh shoot of the Monongahela Valley Sportsmen's League, held at Clarksburg, September 5, was very poorly attended, owing to the very inclement weather, it having rained for days and nights. The Westy Hogans took five or six of our shooters, and the several fairs

cut into the attendance. The weather was all that could be undesirable, rain, high wind, dark and light all in one event kept you on edge. No high scores were made, but all shot well considering the conditions. The Clarksburg Club won the team race, J. F. Programs will be mailed to you in the near future. We will use McCrea traps, White Flyers, throw them 50 yards, and if you don't hit them you are not pointing. Better try this one.
