Macaulay Medal Shoot.

Newark, N. J., October 5.—Jackie Clarke, the clever little Australian cyclist, and Cy Parkin, twirler on the staff of the Newark Eastern League base ball team, shot a 25-target match for the "Championship of South Dakota and Australia" at the Fred W. Macaulay Business Men's Gun Club yesterday afternoon. Parkin finally annexed the title after breaking eleven targets out of the possible 25. Clarke managed to bring down nine birds. Honors of the day went to John Geiger, who broke 133 targets out of 150, and won a match from Rube Waddell by a score of 21 to 24. The Rube also did some very good shooting. Out of 200 targets he broke all but 39. At one time Waddell had broken 24 targets straight, but he missed a perfect string by dropping his last bird. The James E. Wheaton Medal, which was won last week by James J. Quinn, was awarded yesterday.

Quinn was the only contestant in the medal shoot, whose aggregate score, with handicap added, amounted to 200. The total birds shot at was 200. Frank Mihlon and Roland Hopper were close to Quinn in the trophy race. Club members predict that if Quinn keeps up his good work he will rank as one of the best marksmen in the State.
