Despite the wind and snow several good scores were made, Young carrying away most of the first honors.

J. S. Cole, the genial and pleasant U. M. C. Remington representative, drifted out our way, stopping here for a day on his way to Detroit.

A regular old-fashioned blizzard raged Sunday afternoon, but it failed to dampen the spirits of the 17 shooters who faced the traps on the firing line and the many spectators who watched the sport from the club house windows.

A good warm fire in the club house made it comfortable and after the marksman had shot a frame they would gather around the stove to warm up, and all had a fine time, enjoying the shooting, chatting and visiting with each other, and altogether the spirit of sociability reigned supreme.

Young cleaned up in the next two frames of 25 by breaking 23 in each frame, losing only four out of the 50. Riley gave him a close chase by getting 22, while Mrs. Fetherston showed her mettle by coming in with 20. Mrs. Taggart tried a 12-gauge for the first time and broke 10 out of 25.

In event No. 1, at 50 singles, Young ground up 45 from the 20-yard mark, Stannard also getting 45, shooting from 16 yards. Riley kept quite close on their tracks by landing 43 from 18 yards, while Cole came in with a score of 41. Fetherston and Taggart each broke 40, Fetherston from 19 yards and Taggart from 18 yards.

Sociability is one of the things we need at all our club meets, and we are glad to see quite an improvement in it, for when each and every member makes it his or her business to make it pleasant for everyone else it is time well spent, and all enjoy the afternoon and feel as though they want to be with us as often as circumstances will permit.

Crocker brought along four friends, or perhaps it would be coming a little closer to the mark if I would say that his friend, C. S. McDonald, brought them out in his automobile. This was their first visit to our park, and while none of them have ever tried their hand at trap shooting, we hope to enlist them on our roll in the near future; and they will find the shooting game very fascinating when once they get started at it.

Event No. 2 at 20 pairs, proved to be a corker for most all the marksmen, as the wind would drive the second bird down so fast that it took extra quick shooting to get a shot at it before it landed on the ground. In this event Stannard broke 50 from 16 yards, Young getting 25 from 18 yards, Cole bringing down 23, Eck 21 from 17 yards, and Riley 20 from 16 yards. Mott did fine work on five extra pairs by breaking eight out of the 10.

Jack Brewer Beats Munson.

Philadelphia, Pa., December 23.—Jack Brewer, the veteran wing shot and former champion of the world, defeated J. Munson, the recognized champion of New Jersey, in

a match at 100 white flyers for \$100 a side at the Eagle Gun Club grounds, Manoa, yesterday. Brewer won the match by the small margin of one, landing 93 out of 100, against 92 for Munson. The match was for the championship of New Jersey, and it attracted a large gathering from various points in Pennsylvania, New Jersey and Delaware, many wing and target shooters of prominence being on hand to witness the shoot. Both

men finished the match in remarkable form, each man getting his 25 flyers straight. Brewer finished with a straight run of 47. Munson dropped his last 26 straight, losing two in a row before starting his final streak of clean scoring. The men shot in splendid form, considering the cold weather, and the flyers proved to be a fast lot. The scores:
